

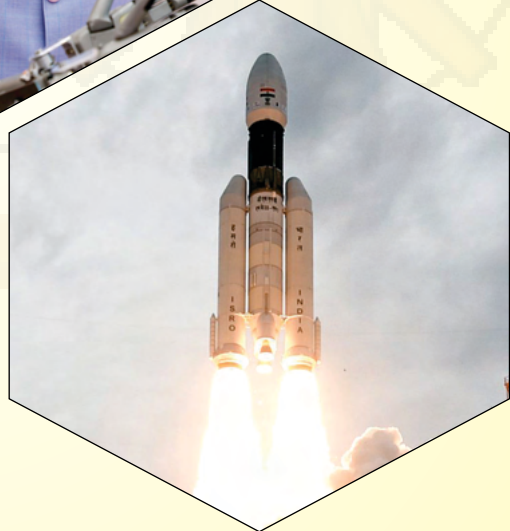

Introduction

1.1 Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises

1.1.1 Background: Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) sector has emerged as a highly vibrant and dynamic sector of the Indian economy contributing around 31.1% of India's GDP, over 48.5% of India's exports. It contributes significantly to the economy and social development of the country by fostering entrepreneurship and generating large employment opportunities at comparatively lower capital cost, next only to agriculture. MSME are complementary to large industries as ancillary units. This sector contributes significantly to inclusive industrial development of the country. An overview of growth and performance of MSME sector in the country is provided in Chapter 3.

1.1.2 Ministry of MSME envisions a progressive MSME sector by promoting growth and development of small business, including khadi, cottage, village and coir industries, in cooperation with other Ministries/Departments, State Governments and other stakeholders, by providing support to existing enterprises, adopting cutting edge technologies and encouraging creation of new enterprises. The Ministry is dedicated to fostering inclusive growth by efforts which ensure geographic inclusivity of rural and urban areas and demographic inclusivity of socially and economically weaker sections such as SC/ST communities and promote women entrepreneurship to boost gender parity.

Sustainable development of globally competitive Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) as an engine of growth for the Indian economy.

1.1.3 Ministry of MSME implements various schemes for credit support, technological assistance, infrastructure development, skill development and training, enhancing competitiveness and market assistance to MSME, aimed at creating self-employment opportunities. A detailed list of schemes is provided in Chapter-5.

1.1.4 To achieve the objective of promotion and development of MSME sector in the country, the Ministry is supported by a number of statutory and non-statutory bodies under its aegis namely, the Office of the Development Commissioner-MSME, the Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC), the Coir Board, National Small Industries Corporation (NSIC), National Institute for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (ni-msme) and Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialisation (MGIRI). Details about the mandate and performance of these organizations and statutory bodies are provided in Chapter – 4.

1.1.5 The Ministry is also committed towards the progressive use of Official Language “Hindi” in all its attached Offices, besides, continuous measures on Vigilance, RTI and prevention of sexual harassment. Detailed information can be seen at Chapter-7.

1.2 Mandate of Ministry of MSME

1.2.1 On 9 May 2007, the erstwhile Ministry of Small Scale Industries and the Ministry of Agro and Rural Industries were merged to form the Ministry of MSME, with the mandate in respect of all matters of policy and planning relating to and coordination of all measures for development of micro, small and medium enterprises, including khadi, cottage, village and coir industries.

1.2.2 **Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises Development Act, 2006** provides a comprehensive statutory framework for the recognition, promotion, development, and protection of MSME in the country. The key features of the Act include:

- **Statutory definition and classification of MSME**, enabling uniform identification of micro, small, and medium enterprises and providing the legal basis for targeted policy support.
- **Mandatory registration framework for MSME**, facilitating formal recognition of enterprises and enabling their access to government schemes, incentives, and support mechanisms.
- **Promotion and development measures**, including provisions for credit facilitation, preferential public procurement, creation of dedicated funds, and grant support, aimed at enhancing productivity, technology adoption, and market access.
- **Legal framework for addressing delayed payments**, mandating timely payment to micro and small enterprises, providing for penal interest on delayed payments, and establishing Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Councils (MSEFCs) for dispute resolution.
- **Strengthened financial discipline and transparency**, including disclosure of outstanding dues to MSME in buyers’ financial statements and disallowance of interest on delayed payments as a tax deduction.

Overall, MSME Act, 2006 serves as the cornerstone legislation for MSME governance in India, balancing developmental support with legal safeguards to enhance the sector’s resilience, competitiveness, and contribution to economic growth.

1.2.3 The Khadi and Village Industries Act, 1956: The Khadi and Village Industries Commission Act, 1956 provides the statutory framework for the establishment of the Khadi and Village Industries Commission for the regulation, and development of the khadi and village industries in the country. The Act mandates the Khadi and Village Industries Commission, as a statutory body under the Government of India, to plan, promote, facilitate, organize and assist in the development of khadi and village industries including measures relating to training, raw materials, marketing, research, quality, etc. and other matters connected therewith or incidental thereto, in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

1.2.4 Definition of Micro, Small and Medium enterprises:

To help MSME scale operations and access better resources, the investment and turnover limits for classification have been increased by 2.5 times and 2 times, respectively. This is expected to improve efficiency, technological adoption, and employment generation.

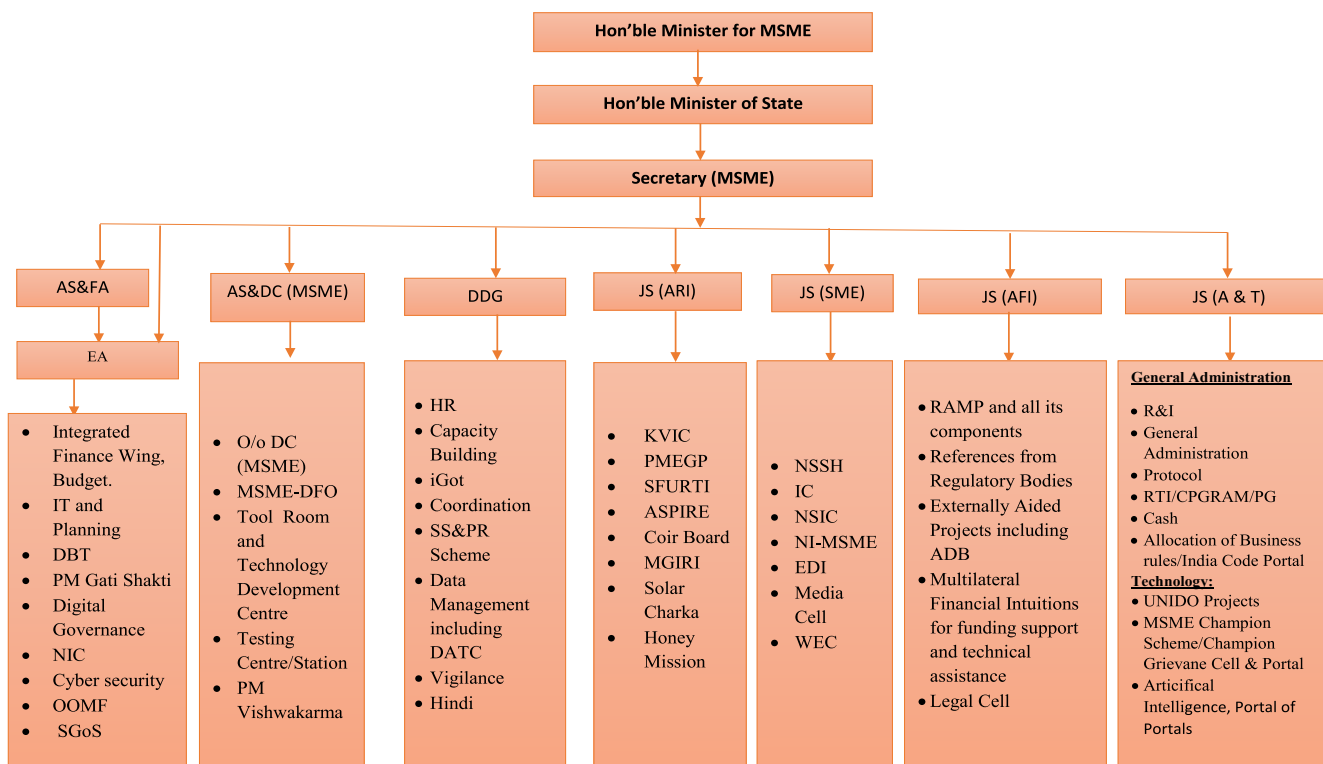
Vide Ministry of MSME's Notification dated 21st March, 2025, the criteria for classifying enterprises has been revised, w.e.f. 1st April, 2025, as part of the Union Budget Announcements 2025-26. The revised classification criteria are as follows:-

- **a micro enterprise**, where the investment in plant and machinery or equipment does not exceed 2.5 crore and turnover does not exceed 10 crore;
- **a small enterprise**, where the investment in plant and machinery or equipment does not exceed 25 crore and turnover does not exceed 100 crore; and
- **a medium enterprise**, where the investment in plant and machinery or equipment does not exceed 125 crore and turnover does not exceed 500 crore.

1.2.5 Government of India supports and supplements the efforts of the State Governments and Union Territory Administrations through various initiatives, aimed at encouraging entrepreneurship, creating employment and livelihood opportunities, and enhancing the competitiveness of MSME in the evolving economic landscape.

1.3 Organisational Structure

1.3.1 Ministry of MSME consists of Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) Division, Agro and Rural Industry (ARI) Division, Administration and Financial Institutions (AFI) Division, Administration and Technology Division (A&T), Integrated Finance Wing (IFW) and Data Analytics and Technical Co-ordination (DATC) Wing, besides the Office of the Development Commissioner (DC, MSME) as an attached office, and other subordinate organisations. The organogram of the Ministry is depicted below.



1.3.2 SME Division- SME Division oversees the administrative supervision of NSIC Ltd. and ni-msme, and is responsible for implementing key initiatives such as the National SC/ST Hub Scheme, International Cooperation Scheme, Women Entrepreneurship Cell, and Assistance to Training Institutions, among others. The Division also manages the Ministry’s media and outreach campaigns for promotion of schemes through electronic, print, and social media platforms.

1.3.3 ARI Division - ARI Division looks after the administration of two statutory bodies - the Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) and Coir Board and of the Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialisation (MGIRI). It also supervises the implementation of the Prime Minister’s Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) and A Scheme for Promoting Innovation, Rural Industry and Entrepreneurship (ASPIRE).

1.3.4 AFI Division - RAMP section in the AFI Division implements the newly launched World Bank supported Central Sector Scheme “Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance” which aims at improving firm capabilities in MSME sector through increased outreach of existing schemes, and increased Centre-State collaboration.

1.3.5 A&T Division: Responsible for administrative supervision of Champions Scheme and Desk, Public Grievances, CPGRAM, Innovation, Sustainability, Externally aided Projects and General Establishment.

1.3.6 IF Wing - IFW of the Ministry scrutinizes financial proposals from the Ministry and the Office of DC (MSME), provides concurrence and policy advice on expenditure-related matters,

and examines Cabinet/EFC/SFC proposals. The Wing also examines other miscellaneous matters relating to signing of MoU/Agreements/ Contracts etc.

1.3.7 Budget Division - Budget Division is primarily responsible for budget formulation, fund release, and expenditure monitoring of the Ministry. Its key functions include preparation of Demands for Grants, Budget Estimates, Revised Estimates, Appropriation Accounts, and monthly/quarterly monitoring of expenditure, including SCSP, TASP and NER components. The Division also handles monitoring of unspent balances, uploading of budget data on UBIS, coordination for parliamentary and departmental meetings, and other related budgetary and financial management activities.

1.3.8 DATC Wing- This Wing undertakes analysis of data/ statistics related to MSME Sector and provides technical inputs for evidence based decision making pertaining to MSME Sector. Technical coordination with all stakeholders towards development and maintenance of MSME databases.

1.3.9 Media Cell- Media Cell promotes MSME schemes and initiatives through social media, digital, print, outdoor, and electronic media. It disseminates scheme benefits and success stories via social media platforms and the quarterly e-newsletter MSME Connect, conducts paid publicity through TV, radio, print, outdoor media, and short videos, and publicizes major events such as the *PM Vishwakarma Conclave, MSME Day 2025, India International Trade Fair 2025 etc.*

1.4 Budgetary outlay

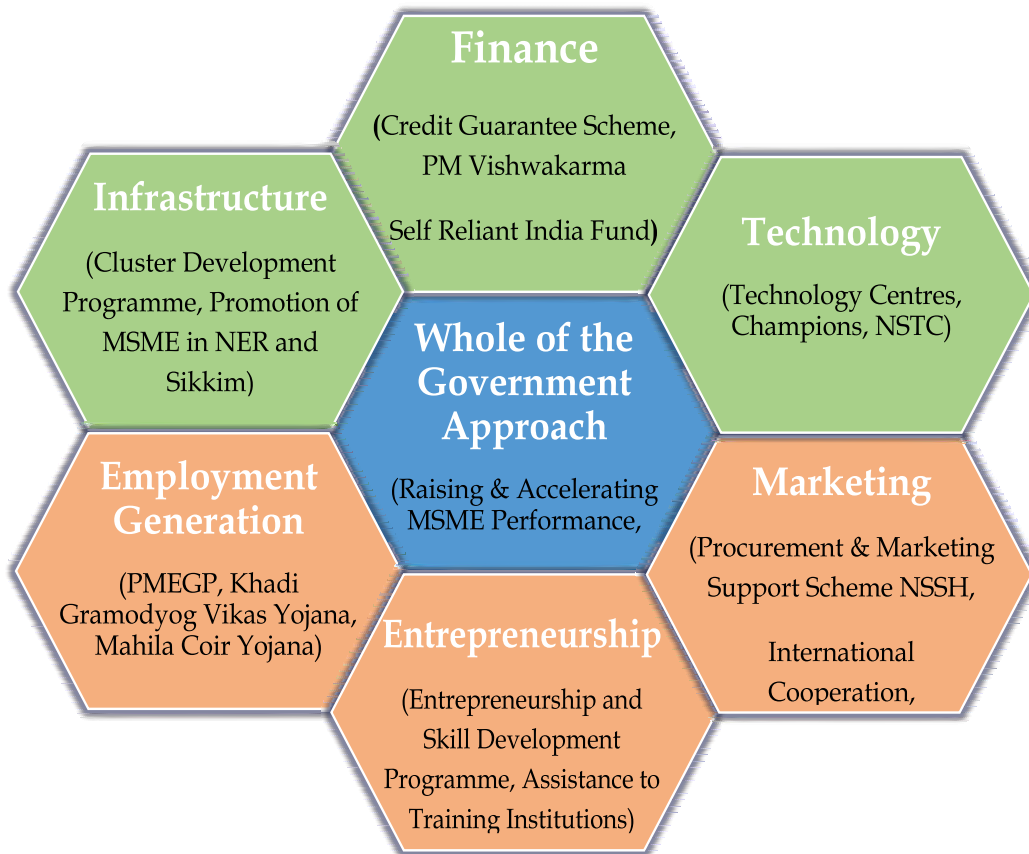

1.5 Flagship Schemes of the Ministry

Ministry of MSME has launched a range of dynamic and comprehensive schemes aimed at fostering the growth and development of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises across the country. These initiatives span several key areas including finance, technology, infrastructure, employment generation, entrepreneurship, and marketing. Through programs such as the PM Vishwakarma, Credit Guarantee Scheme, Technology Centres, PMEGP, and Procurement and Marketing Support Scheme, the Ministry seeks to enhance access to resources, improve innovation, and promote inclusivity, particularly for women, SC/ST entrepreneurs, and those in underserved regions. By leveraging these initiatives, the Ministry is committed to improving the overall competitiveness, sustainability, and scalability of MSME, thus contributing to job creation, economic resilience, and the nation's growth trajectory. These initiatives are schematically represented below around their core thematic areas and key objectives:

1.6 Direct Benefit Transfers (DBTs) of Ministry of MSME

- 1.6.1 Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) system of the Government of India enhances the efficiency of fund delivery, streamlines existing processes, ensures faster and simpler fund flow, accurate targeting of beneficiaries, and reduces the risks of duplication and fraud.

1.6.2 To oversee the implementation of DBT programmes, a dedicated DBT Cell has been established within the Ministry. The schemes are categorized based on the type of benefit provided to the beneficiaries, which include Cash, Kind, or a Composite (both Cash and Kind). Below is a table detailing the key DBT schemes of the Ministry, including the benefit type, number of beneficiaries, and total funds transferred or expenditure incurred:

1.7 Grievance Monitoring

The Ministry addresses all grievances through the Centralized Public Grievance Redress and Monitoring System (CPGRAMS). In addition to CPGRAMS, the Ministry has launched the Samadhaan system, an online grievance monitoring platform specifically designed to track and manage other grievances and suggestions received from MSME. Complementing these mechanisms is the Champions portal, which serves as a holistic platform for redressal, guidance, and handholding of MSME, offering support in finance, marketing, technology, and capacity building, while also disseminating information in eleven regional languages via 69 State control rooms nationwide.

1.7.1 MSME Samadhaan: To address issues of Delayed Payment to MSE

Sections 15–24 of MSME Act, 2006 provide a statutory mechanism to address delayed payments to Micro and Small Enterprises (MSE). Where payments are delayed beyond 45 days, MSE may seek redressal through Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Council (MSEFC) constituted in each State/UT.

To further strengthen this framework, Ministry of MSME launched MSME Samadhaan Portal in October 2017. The portal enables online filing and tracking of delayed payment cases and provides visibility of outstanding dues from CPSEs, Central Ministries, State Governments, and other buyers. Complaints filed on the portal are required to be registered by the concerned MSEFC within 15 days.

Several States, including Punjab, Maharashtra, Telangana, Odisha, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal, and Delhi, have established multiple MSEFCs to ensure timely and effective disposal of cases.

Since inception of the Portal, up to 31st December 2025, MSE have filed 2,56,892 applications, involving an amount of ₹ 55,244.31 crore. Of these, 24,238 cases have been resolved through mutual settlements, totalling ₹ 3,018.37 crore. Additionally, 52,744 applications are yet to be reviewed by MSEFC, involving ₹ 8,397.25 crore, while 47,088 applications have been converted into cases, involving ₹ 14,243 crore. In total, 53,911 cases have been successfully disposed of by MSEFCs, involving an amount of ₹ 14,638.38 crore.

A special sub-portal within the Samadhaan portal, launched on 14th June 2020, enables the reporting of dues and monthly payments by GoI Ministries and CPSEs to MSE. All new delayed payment cases are being filed on newly launched MSME ODR Portal w.e.f. 15th October, 2025, which is being integrated with the Samadhaan Portal.

1.7.2 Champions Portal

The Champions portal is a platform for resolution, redressal and remedies. It is a facility provided by the Ministry of MSME for: -

- Ensuring a speedy, convenient, and effective redressal of MSME grievances.
- Handholding and helping MSME in their navigation of various government schemes/policies.
- Providing guidance and advisory services in areas of Finance, Marketing, Technology, Raw Material, Labour, Infrastructure and Capacity Building.
- Connecting MSME with key officials of Ministry, State Governments, Lending Institutions and Government agencies.
- Disseminating of information and details of all schemes of the Ministry of MSME.

During the financial year 2025–26, Ministry of MSME CHAMPIONS portal received a total of 39,494 grievances, out of which 39,387 were successfully redressed by the CHAMPIONS

Control Room. This reflects a disposal rate of 99.72 percent, reflecting the portal's strong responsiveness and the effectiveness of its grievance-redressal mechanisms.

Moreover, of the grievances replied during FY 2025-26, 25,503 grievances (around 64.75 percent) were redressed within 48 hours, demonstrating the portal's commitment to timely support and handholding MSME.

1.8 Procurement

1.8.1 Public Procurement Policy

To ensure an assured market for Micro and Small Enterprises (MSE), Ministry of MSME notified the Public Procurement Policy for MSE under MSMED Act, 2006, effective from 1st April 2012 and mandatory w.e.f. 1st April 2015.

In November, 2018, the Hon'ble Prime Minister launched the "Support and Outreach Programme" for MSME sector, which included 12 key initiatives for MSME growth. In line with this, the Public Procurement Policy for MSE Order, 2012 was amended on 9th November 2018 vide Gazette Notification No. S.O. 5670(E), setting the annual procurement target to 25%, including 4% from SC/ST-owned MSE and 3% from women-owned MSE.

1.8.2 MSME Sambandh Portal for Public Procurement from MSE

To ensure effective monitoring of procurement by Central Government Ministries, Departments, and CPSEs, Ministry of MSME launched MSME Sambandh Portal in December, 2017. The portal facilitates the implementation of the Public Procurement Policy for MSE by tracking procurement data. As indicated by the portal, 48.27% of the total procurement of ₹ 1,90,276.67 crore is reported by 180 CPSEs which is done from MSE benefitting 2,11,251 MSE. Of this, only 3.50% was from women owned enterprises and 1.62% from SC-ST owned enterprises.

1.8.3 Government e-Market Place (GeM)

Ministry of MSME is actively encouraging MSME to onboard the GeM (Government e-Marketplace) Portal. To simplify this process, a dedicated option has been integrated into the Udyam Registration online form, allowing MSME to express their willingness to join GeM seamlessly.

As of 14th January 2026, data from the GeM portal highlights the total number of onboarded MSE along with their corresponding order value, reflecting the increasing participation and contribution of MSME in public procurement.

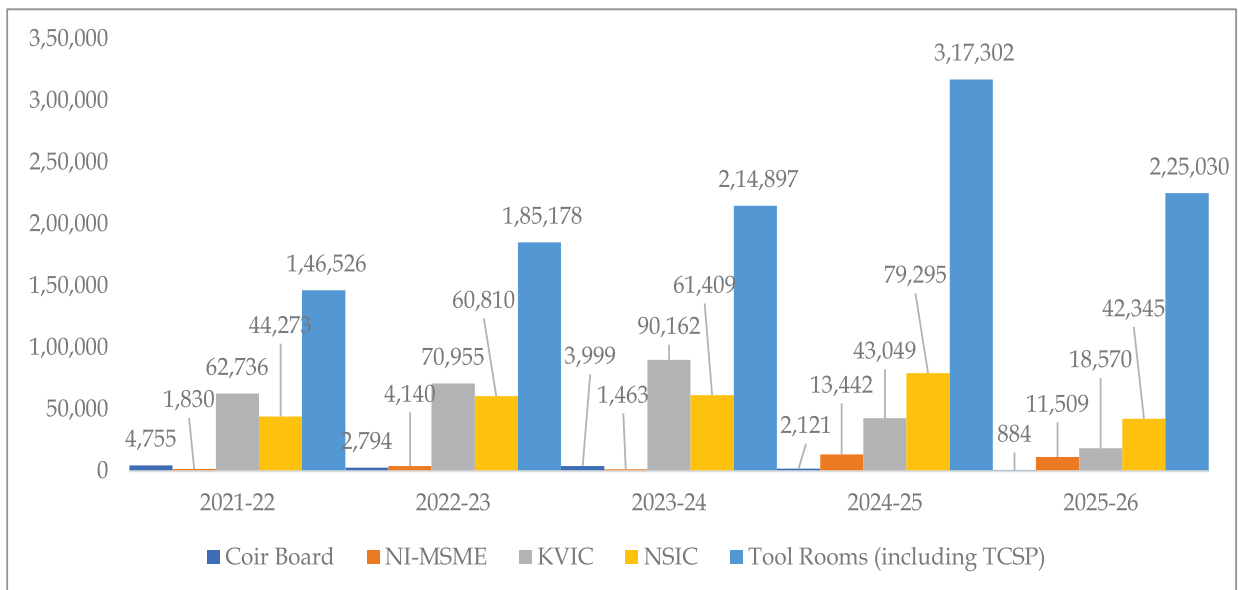

1.9 Skill Training Eco-system of Ministry of MSME

Ministry of MSME has developed a comprehensive skilling ecosystem to meet the workforce needs of MSME across emerging and traditional sectors, focusing on employability, entrepreneurship, and wage employment. Skill training is delivered through KVIC, Coir Board, NSIC, ni-msme, and MSME Technology Centres, catering to participants from school dropouts to advanced graduates.

Programmes offer certifications, diplomas, and postgraduate qualifications, including specialised skill upgradation for Khadi, Village Industries, and the Coir sector. All trainings are aligned with the NSQF under the Skill India Mission and implemented through schemes such as TR and IT, TCSP, ATI, National SC/ST Hub, Khadi Gramodaya Vikas Yojana, Coir Vikas Yojana, and Mahila Coir Yojana, along with customised, industry-driven courses.

The progress of Skill development programmes conducted by various organizations of the M/o MSME since 2021-22 to 2025-26 is provided in the bar chart as below:



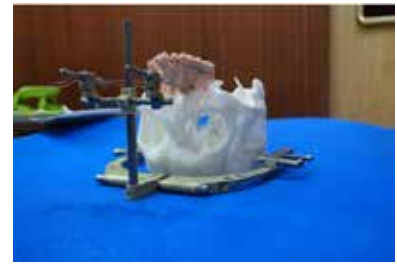

1.10 Measures Under Aatmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan

1.10.1 Self-Reliance and Indigenous Capability Development

As part of its broader *Aatmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan*, Ministry of MSME has undertaken several initiatives to enhance self-reliance and strengthen domestic manufacturing capabilities. A key intervention in this direction is the nationwide network of Technology Centres (TCs). These Centres are equipped with advanced machinery and infrastructure and function as self-sustaining, autonomous bodies providing access to advanced manufacturing technologies, skilled manpower, and technical and business advisory support to MSME.

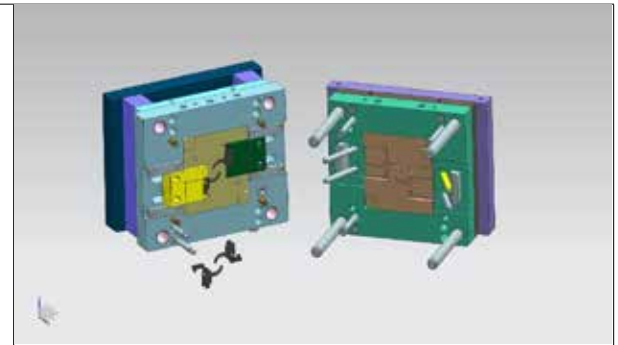
A) Indigenous Medical Device Development: Central Tool Room and Training Centre, Bhubaneswar developed the Rigid External Distraction (RED-II) medical system through advanced reverse engineering and precision machining, demonstrating indigenous capability in complex medical assemblies.



B) Aerospace Component Manufacturing for HAL: Central Tool Room, Ludhiana indigenously developed fixtures and jigs for Sukhoi aircraft components for Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL), thereby strengthening aerospace indigenisation.



C) Defence Manufacturing – Arms and Ammunition: Indo-German Tool Room, Ahmedabad developed a multi-cavity metal injection mould for triggers used in arms and ammunition, supporting domestic defence production.



D) Indigenous Defence Gear for Extreme Conditions: MSME-Technology Development Centre (PPDC), Meerut developed high-altitude sleeping bags and multipurpose defence boots for the Indian Army (usable up to -50°C), reducing costs by 40%.



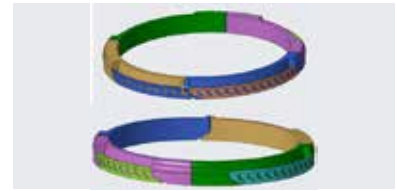
E) Indigenous Drone Development: MSME-Technology Development Centre (PPDC), Agra, in collaboration with NIT Srinagar, developed a self-balancing fixed-wing drone with 80% indigenous components, supporting logistics and disaster response.



F) RF and Microwave Components for Strategic Electronics: Tool Room and Training Centre, Guwahati developed S-Band waveguide adaptors for RF and microwave applications, achieving 50% cost reduction and 30% faster delivery.



G) Aerospace Engine Component: Central Institute of Tool Design, Hyderabad manufactured nozzle segments with aerofoil features for High Pressure Compressor (HPC) applications, strengthening aerospace supply chains.



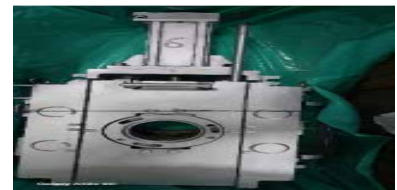
H) Automotive Machinery Import Substitution: Indo-German Tool Room, Indore manufactured a critical face plate for turbocharger balancing machines, promoting self-reliance with 60% cost savings and faster availability.



I) Railway and Steel Industry Components Indo-Danish Tool Room, Jamshedpur developed mounting bases for auto couplers, resulting in 50% cost reduction and 30% lead-time reduction.



J) Steel Manufacturing Process Equipment Indo-Danish Tool Room, Jamshedpur developed the AL-80 mechanism used in steel making processes, achieving 45% cost reduction.



K) Components for Pharmaceutical: Tool Room and Training Centre, Guwahati manufactured Pick and Place Toy Rods for eye-drop filling machines, resulting in 60% cost reduction and 80% time savings.



L) Indigenous Components for Pouch Filling Machines: Tool Room and Training Centre, Guwahati manufactured components for Automatic Spouting Machines (ASM) used in pouch filling, resulting in 40% cost reduction.



M) High-Productivity Press Tools: Central Tool Room and Training Centre, Kolkata manufactured a hydraulic double-action draw press tool, resulting in a 50% increase in productivity.



N) **Tools for Steel Rolling Industry:** Central Tool Room, Ludhiana developed templates for steel rolling rollers, improving quality control in steel rolling operations.

O) **Combination Tool Development:** Central Institute of Tool Design, Hyderabad manufactured a Combination Tool (Blanking and Forming), saving three months of lead time.



1.10.2 Rs 50,000 crore Equity infusion for MSME through Self Reliant India Fund (Fund of Funds)

- The objective of Self Reliant India Fund (SRI Fund) is to address the challenge of providing finance to MSME through equity infusion. It is essential to identify pools of capital which can be further leveraged in order to create a multiplier effect on the economy and, therefore, making MSME more competitive in the global markets.
- Under Aatmanirbhar Bharat Package, the Government of India announced to set up an INR 10,000 crore Fund of Funds for MSME. This fund, which is called Self Reliant India (SRI) Fund, has the objective of supporting Venture Capital (VC) / Private Equity (PE) firms investing in MSME sector.
- This Fund addresses the equity funding challenges of MSME sector and provides a thrust to break their barriers, and allow them to grow to their full inherent potential to become global champions. SRI Fund is able to channelize diverse variety of funds into under-served MSME and address the growth needs of viable and high growth MSME.

- In order to implement the SRI Fund, on 1st September, 2021, a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) viz; National Small Industry Corporation (NSIC) Venture Capital Fund Limited (NVCFL) got registered as an Alternative Investment Fund (AIF) Category-II. Subsequently, the Contribution Agreement amongst (i) Ministry of MSME, Government of India; (ii) National Small Industries Corporation Limited; (iii) NVCFL; and (iv) SBI-CAP Ventures Limited was signed on 12th October, 2021.
- The funds to be mobilised by the Daughter funds and committed by SRI Fund are in the ratio of 4:1. The SRI Fund is likely to create a multiplier effect, providing significant liquidity of INR 50,000 cr to MSME sector and thereby enabling economic growth of the country.

Status: Since its inception in October 2021, as on 31.12.2025, 69 Daughter Funds have been empanelled with NVCFL (Mother Fund) and these daughter funds have assisted 693 MSME by way of investment of ₹ 16,260 crore in these MSME. Out of 693 MSME assisted, 90 MSME are led by Women entrepreneurs, 22 MSME are led by OBC entrepreneurs and 3 MSME are led by SC/ST entrepreneurs.

1.11 Special Campaign 5.0: Institutionalising Swachhata and Minimizing Pendency

Special Campaign 5.0, launched by Ministry of MSME on 2 October 2025, focused on institutionalizing *Swachhata*, disposal of e-waste and obsolete scrap, and clearing pendency related to PMO/VIP references, public grievances, parliamentary assurances, and file reviews.

Ministry and its field formations achieved 100% targets on 7 parameters and over 95% on 3 others, alongside improvements in workplace cleanliness and efficiency. By 31st October, 2025, 23,162 physical files were reviewed and 4,280 were weeded out; 953 e-files were reviewed and 623 closed. Scrap disposal generated ₹22.89 lakh, freeing 21,045.90 sq. ft. of office space.

In addition to measures for institutionalizing cleanliness and reducing pendency, Ministry and its organizations/field offices adopted best practices focusing on e-waste management, eco-friendly initiatives, Jan Bhagidari, and waste-to-wealth activities, some of which are highlighted below:-

- a) Under this year's edition of the campaign, special focus has been placed on e-Waste Management to ensure safe and scientific disposal of electronic waste such as computers, printers, and peripherals from all offices and field units under the Ministry only through authorized recyclers, strictly in line with the E-Waste (Management) Rules, 2022.
- b) Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialization (MGIRI), Wardha, created a statue of Mother Cow using scrap iron in Wardha, embodying the theme of 'Waste



to Wealth'. The initiative aimed to promote environmental consciousness and raise awareness about animal health and protection. MGIRI also organized a street play at Arvi Naka for spreading Swachhata awareness.

c) Ministry of MSME and its organizations have taken significant steps to promote women's health and hygiene and environmentally responsible method for disposing of menstrual waste including the following:



- Ministry of MSME has installed Sanitary napkins vending machines at newly inaugurated Kartavya Bhavan 3, New Delhi.
- MGIRI has also installed Sanitary napkins vending machines at Mahila Ashram Buniyadi School, Wardha, Maharashtra.

d) At CCRI, Kalavoor, Alappuzha, compost pits were established using fallen leaves, coir pith and other organic waste. This initiative promotes nutrient recycling, improves soil health, and supports environmentally sustainable waste management.

- e) **Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam** : The programme “Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam” was held at MSME-DFO, Connaught Place, New Delhi on 18.05.2025 in the presence of the Hon’ble Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Majhi and Hon’ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje, along with senior officers of the Ministry. The event emphasized on environmental sustainability, with tree plantation undertaken to reinforce Ministry of MSME’s commitment to green and responsible development.



Special Events during the year

Introduction

During the year, Ministry of MSME organized and participated in several landmark events, including Udyam Utsav at Rashtrapati Bhavan, MSME Day-2025, 17th Civil Services Day, IITF-2025, PM Vishwakarma and National SC-ST Hub Conclave, MSME Seva Parv-2025: *Virasat se Vikas*, PM Vishwakarma Haat-2026, and Independence Day Ceremony-2025. These events served as significant platforms for promoting entrepreneurship, market access, innovation, inclusion, and policy outreach, reinforcing Ministry's commitment to strengthening the MSME ecosystem and advancing the vision of Viksit Bharat.

2.1. Udyam Utsav

Ministry of MSME successfully organized 'Udyam Utsav' at Rashtrapati Bhavan from March 20th to March 30th, 2025, celebrating India's MSME sector. The event was inaugurated by Hon'ble President and interacted with the artisans and appreciated their contribution.

The event showcased indigenous crafts, entrepreneurship, and innovation through seven pavilions, featuring handicrafts, agro-based products, Green MSME Technologies, Women and Tribal Entrepreneurs, and PM Vishwakarma beneficiaries.

Seventy (70) exhibitors from across the country participated, presenting their products and innovations. The event attracted over 1.5 lakh visitors, generating business worth ₹77 lakh. Visitors experienced live pottery, trade exhibits, and cultural performances like Hunar Sangeet, Nukkad Natak, and Saree Draping Sessions.

2.2. MSME Day-2025

Ministry of MSME observed MSME Day 2025 on 27 June 2025 at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi, in a hybrid mode, with participation of over 1,300 stakeholders. The event was graced by the Hon'ble President of India, Smt. Droupadi Murmu, as the Chief Guest, along with Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje and Chairman KVIC Shri Manoj Kumar.

Speaking on the occasion, the Hon'ble President of India underscored that MSME form a strong pillar of the Indian economy, contributing significantly to GDP, innovation, and employment generation, particularly in rural and backward areas. Hon'ble President emphasized that a robust MSME ecosystem is essential for sustainable and inclusive economic development, as MSME generate employment at a relatively low cost of capital while empowering weaker sections and decentralizing development. The Hon'ble President noted that Government initiatives such as revision of MSME classification norms, enhanced credit access, mandatory public procurement from MSE, and skill development under PM Vishwakarma Yojana have

resulted in a rapid increase in MSME registrations. Hon'ble President expressed confidence that the Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) Portal would play a critical role in addressing issues of delayed payments.

Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, highlighted the pivotal role of MSME in realizing the vision of Viksit Bharat and Atmanirbhar Bharat, acknowledging the sector's transformative contribution to economic growth, innovation, and resilience.

2.2.1 Key Initiatives and Major Highlights

- **Commemoration of 25 Years of CGTMSE:** Hon'ble President released a special commemorative postage stamp marking 25 years of the Credit Guarantee Fund Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises (CGTMSE). Since inception, CGTMSE has approved over 1.18 crore credit guarantees amounting to ₹9.80 lakh crore, including ₹3.00 lakh crore in FY 2024-25 alone, reflecting the scale and impact of the Credit Guarantee Scheme.

- **Launch of Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) Portal:** Hon'ble President unveiled the ODR Portal for MSME, operationalized to provide speedy, cost-effective, and end-to-end digital resolution of disputes related to delayed payments. The portal enables online filing, service of notices, documentation, evidence submission, hearings, issuance of orders, and arbitral awards, thereby improving access to justice, reducing litigation costs, and enhancing ease of doing business for MSE.



- **Launch of MSME Hackathon 5.0:** MSME Hackathon 5.0 was launched under MSME Champions Scheme (Incubation Component) to promote innovation, entrepreneurship, and adoption of advanced technologies among MSME.
- **Knowledge Dissemination Initiatives:** Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME launched "MSME Patrika", an in-house journal of the Ministry, and presented its first copy to the Hon'ble President. A booklet titled "Know Your Lender" was also released to guide MSME on credit options, rights, and informed financial decision-making.

2.2.2 MoU and Institutional Collaborations

- MoU signed with C2FO and KReDX (TReDS platforms) to enhance working capital facilitation for MSME.
- MoU between NSIC and Tally Solutions to promote digital empowerment and financial management capabilities of MSME.
- MoU between NSIC and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) for capacity building and entrepreneurship development.
- MoU between Ministry of MSME and CSIR to support commercialization of MSME innovations and facilitate license-free procurement.
- MoU signed with the Governments of Assam and Uttar Pradesh, and with the Department of Fisheries, for Udyam data sharing, aimed at strengthening evidence-based policy formulation and decision-making.
- MoU with State Governments for API-level data integration, further strengthening the digital MSME ecosystem.

2.3. 17th Civil Services Day, 2025

On the occasion of the **17th Civil Services Day**, Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi addressed the nation's civil servants on 21 April 2025 at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi, and conferred the Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Administration. The Government of India celebrates April 21 every year as 'Civil Services day' as an occasion for the Civil Servants to rededicate themselves to the cause of citizens and renew their commitments to public service and excellence in work. This date is chosen to commemorate the day when first Home Minister of Independent India, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel addressed the probationers of Administrative Services Officers in 1947 at Metcalfe House, Delhi. He referred to civil servants as the 'steel frame of India'.

In his address, Hon'ble Prime Minister noted that this year's Civil Services Day is particularly significant as the nation celebrates 75th year of the Constitution and 150th birth anniversary of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. Hon'ble Prime Minister underscored that as India advances with the resolve of building a Viksit Bharat, responsibility resting on civil servants is both immense and historic. Emphasising that "every wheel of the chariot of progress must move together," he called upon officers to remain citizen-centric, integrity-driven, and innovation-oriented, and to work with unwavering determination to ensure holistic development, leaving no village, no family, and no citizen behind.

In 2025, 16 awards were presented under the categories of Holistic Development of Districts, Aspirational Blocks Programme, and Innovation, recognizing exemplary initiatives that have contributed to the welfare of citizens. The Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Administration aim to acknowledge outstanding governance practices and innovations by district, state, and central government organizations.



Under the Innovation (Central) category, Ministry of MSME was conferred the Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Administration 2024 for the PM Vishwakarma Scheme, in recognition of innovative practices adopted during its implementation at the Central Government level.

2.4. “MSME Pavilion” at India International Trade Fair (IITF), 2025

At 44th India International Trade Fair (IITF), held at Bharat Mandapam, New Delhi, Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, inaugurated MSME, Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC), Coir Board and National SC-ST Hub (NSSH) Pavilions. The event was graced by Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje and Chairman, Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) Shri Manoj Kumar.

MSME Pavilion, themed “*Vibrant MSME, Viksit Bharat*”, showcased the diversity and entrepreneurial strength of India's micro and small enterprises, reflecting the vision of *Atmanirbhar Bharat* and *Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat*. A total of 292 stalls were allotted to enterprises and Vishwakarmas from 29 States and Union Territories, with strong representation of women entrepreneurs (over 67%), SC/ST entrepreneurs (over 34%), persons with disabilities, first-time exhibitors and enterprises showcasing GI-tagged and ODOP products.

The pavilions collectively displayed a wide range of products including textiles, handicrafts, handloom, coir and eco-friendly products, metal and leather goods, food items, toys and traditional crafts. The Coir Board Pavilion featured 31 exhibitors highlighting traditional and value-added coir products, providing a platform for artisans and entrepreneurs to connect with potential buyers and explore new market opportunities. The Coir Board pavilion was awarded the Brass Medal at IITF-2025.

The Khadi India Pavilion, themed “*Viksit Bharat @ 2047*”, featured 150 exhibitors from across the country, including units supported under PMEGP and SFURTI, with significant participation from women and SC/ST/OBC entrepreneurs. In parallel, the NSSH Pavilion showcased products from SC-ST entrepreneurs across 10 States, reinforcing the Ministry's commitment to inclusive growth, enterprise development and market access for marginalized sections.

2.5. PM Vishwakarma and National SC-ST Hub Mega Conclave (2nd Anniversary of PM Vishwakarma)- 2025

PM Vishwakarma scheme was launched by the Hon'ble Prime Minister on 17.09.2023, to provide end-to-end support to artisans and craftspeople of 18 trades who work with their hands and tools. In less than 2 years, 30 lakh beneficiaries have successfully registered on PM Vishwakarma Portal.



The Ministry organised the 'PM Vishwakarma and National SC-ST Hub Mega Conclave' on 17 September 2025 in Bodh Gaya, Bihar, to commemorate the second anniversary of the PM Vishwakarma Scheme.

The event was presided over by Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, and graced by Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje, as Guest of Honour. Conclave was also attended by the Hon'ble Minister, Department of Industries, Government of Bihar, Shri Nitish Mishra; the Hon'ble Minister of Cooperation, Government of Bihar, Dr. Prem Kumar; the Hon'ble Minister of Minor Water Resources, Government of Bihar, Shri Santosh Kumar Suman; and Hon'ble Minister of SC & ST Welfare Department, Government of Bihar, Shri Janak Ram.

The mega conclave provided an interactive platform for aspiring and existing entrepreneurs to expand their horizons. More than 2,500 beneficiaries of the PM Vishwakarma Scheme, NSSH, and PMEGP attended the event. The event featured experience-sharing sessions by beneficiaries of the PM Vishwakarma scheme. An exhibition was also organised to showcase and sell products made by artisans and craftspeople. Loan certificates, toolkits/sewing machines and margin money subsidies were given to beneficiaries of PM Vishwakarma, PMEGP, and Gramodyog Vikas Yojana.

Ministry of MSME also signed MoUs with National Institute of Design Ahmedabad (NID) and Institute of Rural Management Anand (IRMA) to enhance design support, capacity building, and rural livelihood enhancement under the PM Vishwakarma Scheme.

2.6. MSME Seva Parv-2025: Virasat se Vikas

Ministry of MSME celebrated MSME Seva Parv-2025: Virasat se Vikas from 28-30 September 2025 at Rudraksh International Cooperation and Convention Centre, Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh. Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, presided over the

inaugural event on 28 September 2025, in the august presence of Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje.

The event brought together artisans, entrepreneurs, institutions, and communities to promote *seva*, cultural heritage, and awareness of MSME initiatives. The Hon'ble Union Minister inaugurated a three-day exhibition featuring 130 stalls, showcasing products by local artisans and craftspeople. In his address, he highlighted the pivotal role of MSME in employment generation and emphasised key initiatives such as Udyam Registration, PMEGP, CGSMSE, and NSSH, along with efforts to strengthen infrastructure, skilling, and access to finance.

As part of the celebrations, Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje participated in Mahila Paricharcha, interacting with women entrepreneurs and SHGs, and encouraged women's financial independence and registration on the Udyam Portal. She also took part in a Swachhata programme at Namoghat, engaging with sanitation workers and appreciating their contribution.

Key highlights of MSME Seva Parv-2025 included exchange of MoU between KVIC and NSIC, distribution of loan cheques to PM Vishwakarma beneficiaries, PMEGP margin money subsidies, and toolkits to Gramodyog Vikas Yojana beneficiaries, reinforcing the Ministry's commitment to inclusive growth and *Viksit Bharat*.

2.7. PM Vishwakarma and National SC-ST Hub Conclave, Odisha

Ministry of MSME organized the PM Vishwakarma–National SC–ST Hub Conclave on 16 April 2025 at Maharaja Sriram Chandra Bhanja Deo University, Baripada, Mayurbhanj, Odisha, co-chaired by Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi and Hon'ble Chief Minister of Odisha Shri Mohan Charan Majhi.

An exhibition with 48 stalls showcased initiatives under PM Vishwakarma, National SC–ST Hub, KVIC, PMEGP, with participation from banks, SIDBI, and coir units. During the event, 6,877 PM Vishwakarma certificates were digitally distributed, along with bank loan handovers to beneficiaries. The Conclave highlighted the role of MSME in employment generation, artisan empowerment, and livelihood enhancement.

2.8. Invitation of NSSH Beneficiaries as 'Special Guests' for Independence Day Ceremony-2025

National SC-ST Hub (NSSH) Scheme, launched in October 2016, aims to promote entrepreneurship among SC/STs and facilitate the mandated 4% public procurement from SC/ST-owned MSE. Scheme supports SC/ST entrepreneurs through skilling, capacity building, technology upgradation, market linkages, and facilitation of bid participation.

Under the Scheme, Ministry invited 100 SC/ST beneficiaries, along with their spouses, as 'Special Guests' of the Government of India to witness the Independence Day Ceremony (IDC)-2025 at the Red Fort, New Delhi. The beneficiaries represented rural and urban areas across various States/UTs, including six North-Eastern States and six Union Territories. The Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME and Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME facilitated the programme, during which beneficiaries shared their entrepreneurial journeys and expressed gratitude to the Government of India.

2.9. PM Vishwakarma Haat

PM Vishwakarma Haat 2026 was held from 17–31 January 2026 at Dilli Haat, INA, New Delhi, and inaugurated on 18 January 2026 by Hon'ble Union Minister for MSME, Shri Jitan Ram Manjhi, and Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje. The event was organized as a flagship market linkage initiative under the PM Vishwakarma Scheme.

A total of 117 PM Vishwakarma artisans from multiple States and Union Territories participated, representing diverse traditional trades. The Haat provided direct market access, uniform PM Vishwakarma-branded stalls and packaging, and facilitation for digital payments and e-commerce onboarding.

The event recorded a footfall of over 50,000 visitors, with artisans generating cumulative sales of approximately ₹2 crore. Interaction with Foreign Missions from over 20 countries enhanced international visibility of Indian crafts.

Overall, PM Vishwakarma Haat 2026 strengthened artisan incomes, branding, digital adoption, and global exposure, demonstrating a scalable model for sustainable livelihood promotion under the PM Vishwakarma Scheme.

2.10. Interaction with Ambassador under South-South Cooperation

A delegation comprising Ambassadors and High Commissioners from Central America, the Caribbean, Oceania, and the West Asia & North Africa regions, led by Ministry of External Affairs, India visited NSIC on 8 January 2026 to gain insights into India's MSME ecosystem and explore avenues for enhanced international cooperation.

The delegation was apprised of India's MSME landscape, institutional support mechanisms, and key initiatives aimed at strengthening enterprise competitiveness. Discussions focused on expanding collaboration in areas such as technology transfer, skilling, incubation, market access, and capacity building. The visit underscored the growing potential of MSME cooperation as a strategic pillar for deepening economic engagement and fostering mutually beneficial partnerships between India and partner countries.

2.11. ODR Portal: Featured in the Economic Survey 2025-26

A key initiative of the year, the ODR Portal, found mention in the Economic Survey, 2025-26. The relevant excerpt is provided below:

“The persistence of delayed payments remains a critical challenge for the MSME sector, with an estimated ₹8.1 lakh crore locked in delayed payments, impacting working capital and restricting growth. When an MSME files a delayed payment case against a buyer, it may strain or even damage the business relationship. Buyers may perceive the filing as an adversarial step and may stop placing new orders or discontinue the partnership altogether. Since MSMEs rely heavily on long-term commercial ties, the fear of losing future business prevent them from pursuing legal option, even when large dues remain pending.”

“The MSE Scheme on Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) for Delayed Payments, along with the MSME ODR Portal developed under it, introduces a structured process that encourages amicable settlement between seller and buyer before the dispute moves into formal adjudication under the MSME Act, 2006. This early, dialogue-based resolution mechanism allows MSMEs to recover delayed payments without undermining business relationships.”

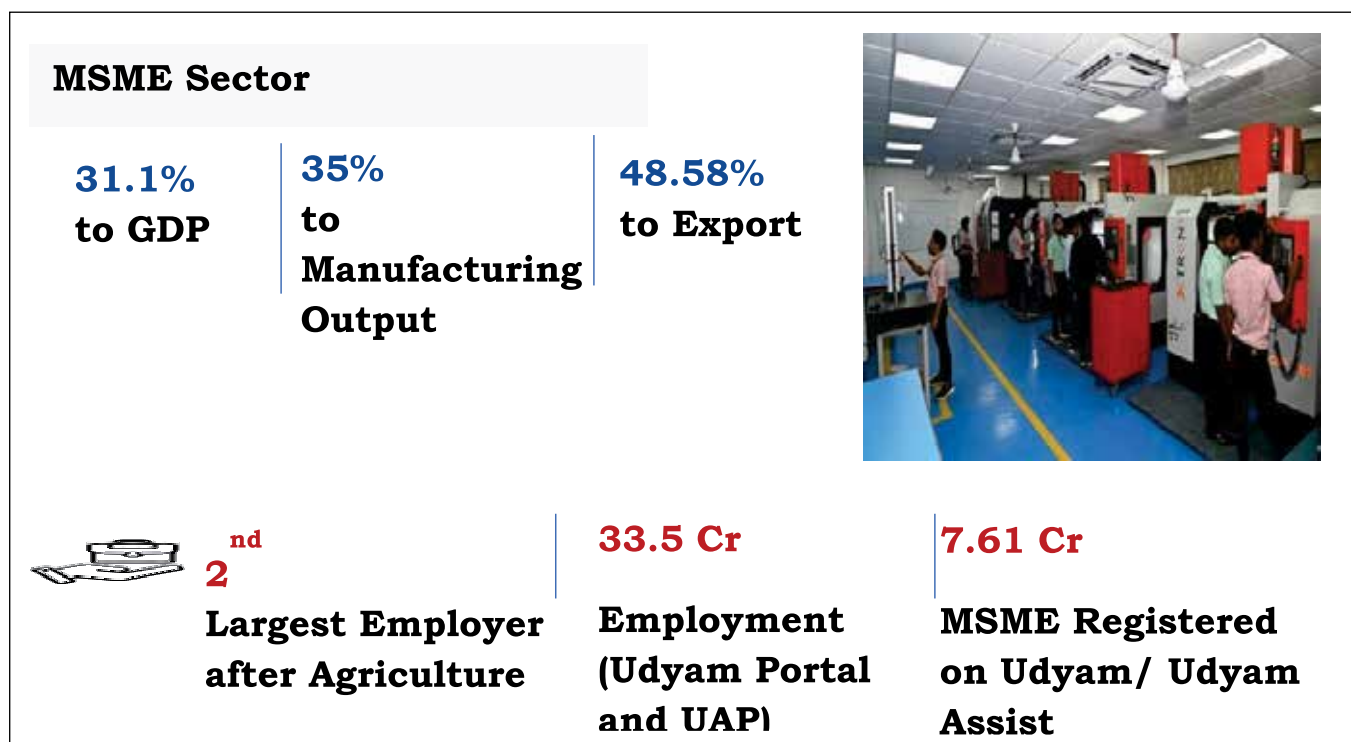
“The portal is designed for accessibility, featuring an end-to-end digital process that is faster and more cost-effective than traditional channels. Its low-cost structure, multilayered resolution mechanism (combining negotiation, conciliation, and arbitration), and 24X7 availability in multiple languages make dispute resolution economically viable even for very small claims. Ultimately, the ODR initiative enhances trust, promotes contractual discipline, and can directly ease the cash-flow stress that plagues the MSME ecosystem, ensuring greater resilience and competitiveness.”

Since its launch, the ODR Portal has disposed of 17 cases within eight months, with 15 cases resolved at the Pre-MSEFC (amicable settlement) stage and 2 cases at the conciliation stage, resulting in settlement of ₹60.60 lakh.

Overview of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) Sector

3.1. Role of MSME in Indian Economy

3.1.1 MSME play a pivotal role in driving entrepreneurial growth and fostering business innovation. By diversifying across sectors, MSME cater to both domestic and global market demands with a wide range of products and services. These enterprises are instrumental in generating significant employment opportunities at a lower capital cost compared to large industries. The role of MSME and contribution in various aspects of the country's economy is as follows:

3.2. Registration of MSME

3.2.1 Udyam Registration Portal: The Udyam Registration Portal serves as the foundational

digital platform for formal recognition of MSME under MSME Act, 2006, enabling uniform identification of enterprises and their seamless access to government schemes, incentives, and statutory benefits. Designed as a simple, online and paperless system, Udyam registration is free of cost and based on self-declaration, significantly reducing compliance burden and promoting ease of doing business. Udyam Portal has replaced the earlier Udyog Aadhaar Memorandum (UAM), creating a dynamic and credible MSME database integrated with PAN and GST systems. All existing and prospective entrepreneurs can register on the Udyam Registration Portal (<https://udyamregistration.gov.in>).

Ministry of MSME, vide notification no. S.O. 4926 (E) dated 18.10.2022 amended Notification No. S.O. No. 2119(E) dated 26.06.2020 to extend the non-tax benefits to MSME. The amendment provides that "In case of an upward change in terms of investment in plant and machinery or equipment or turnover or both, and consequent re-classification, an enterprise shall continue to avail of all non-tax benefits of the category (micro or small or medium) it was in before the re-classification, for a period of three years from the date of such upward change."

Ministry of MSME, vide notification no. S.O. 4926 (E) dated 18.10.2022 amended Notification No. S.O. No. 2119(E) dated 26.06.2020 to extend the non-tax benefits to MSME. The amendment provides that "In case of an upward change in terms of investment in plant and machinery or equipment or turnover or both, and consequent re-classification, an enterprise shall continue to avail of all non-tax benefits of the category (micro or small or medium) it was in before the re-classification, for a period of three years from the date of such upward change."

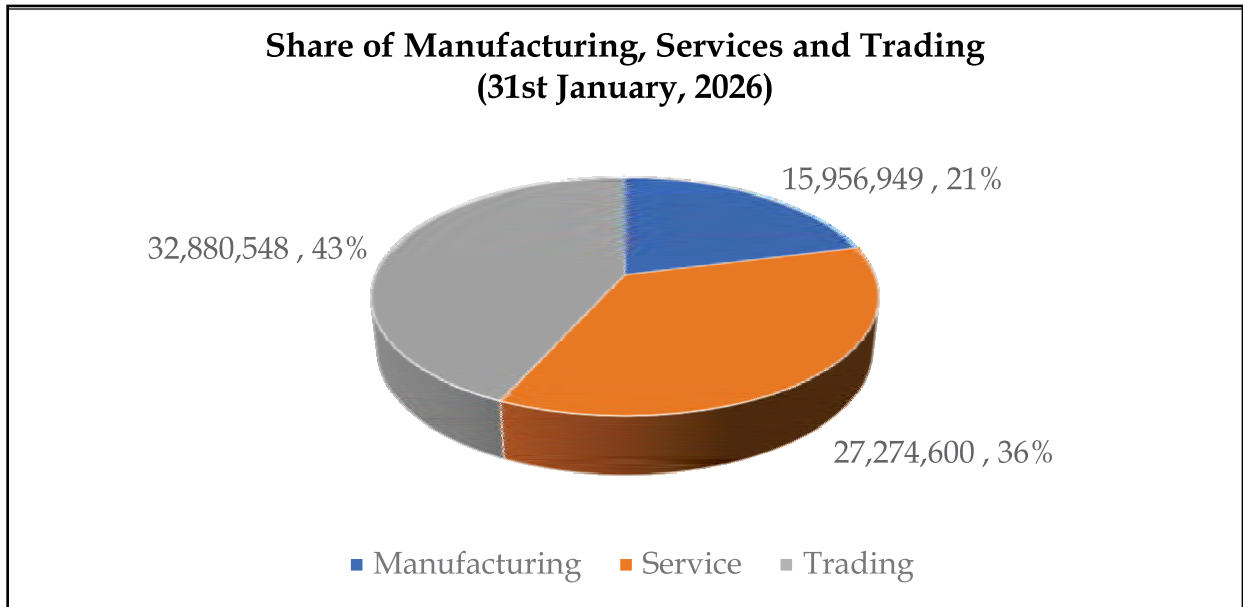
3.2.2 Udyam Assist Platform: Ministry of MSME, in association with Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI), launched a portal Udyam Assist Platform (UAP), for bringing Informal Micro Enterprises (IMEs) into the formal ambit, on 11.01.2023. The Government has notified that the certificate issued on the UAP to IMEs shall be treated at par with Udyam Registration Certificate for the purpose of availing Priority Sector Lending (PSL) benefits. This has helped the registered IMEs to avail the benefits of PSL and on-board IMEs on the UAP to formalize the enterprises which are exempted from GST regime.

As on 31.01.2026, a total number of 7,61,12,097 MSME, including IME on UAP are registered. There are 1,59,56,949 enterprises registered in Manufacturing category, 2,72,74,600 enterprises registered in Service sector and 3,28,80,548 enterprises registered in Trading category.

One of the critical indicators to assess the successful growth of MSME Sector in an economy is the data of registration of new MSME; it also depicts the conducive environment for starting such enterprises in an economy as well as the high morale of entrepreneurs.

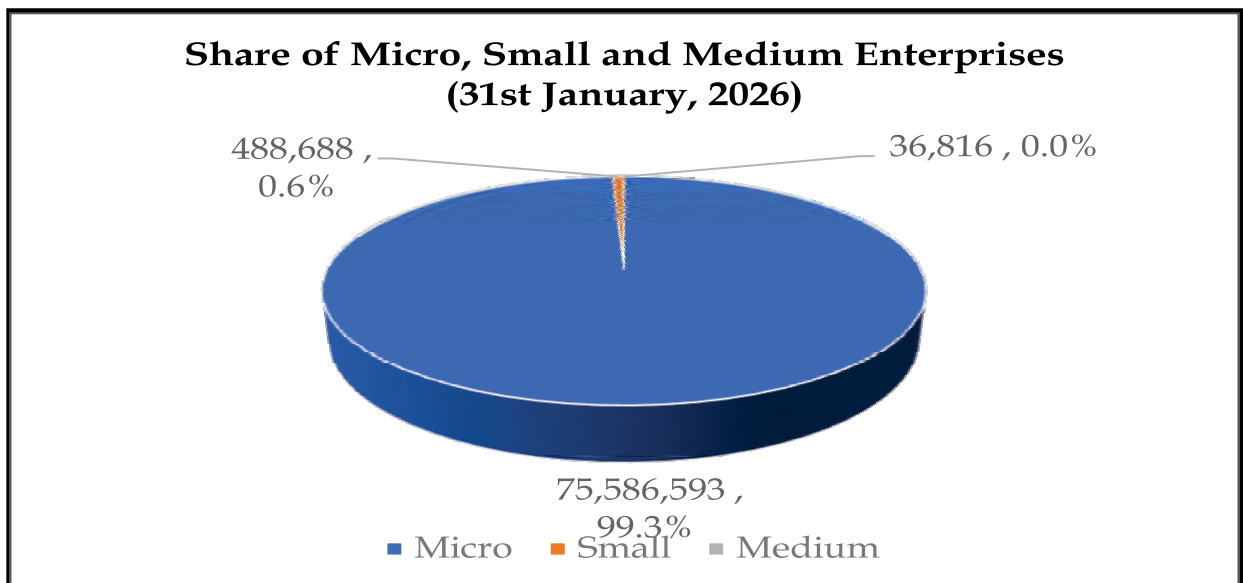
3.2.3 The analysis of Udyam Registration, including IMEs registered on UAP provides a break-up of Manufacturing, Services and Trading MSME. It may be noted that MSME in Trading and Service Sector comprises a larger proportion of Udyam Registration as compared to MSME in Manufacturing Sector. The break-up is provided in Figure 3.1.

Figure 3.1: Share of Udyam Registration including Informal Micro Enterprises on UAP: Manufacturing, Services and Trading as on 31st January, 2026



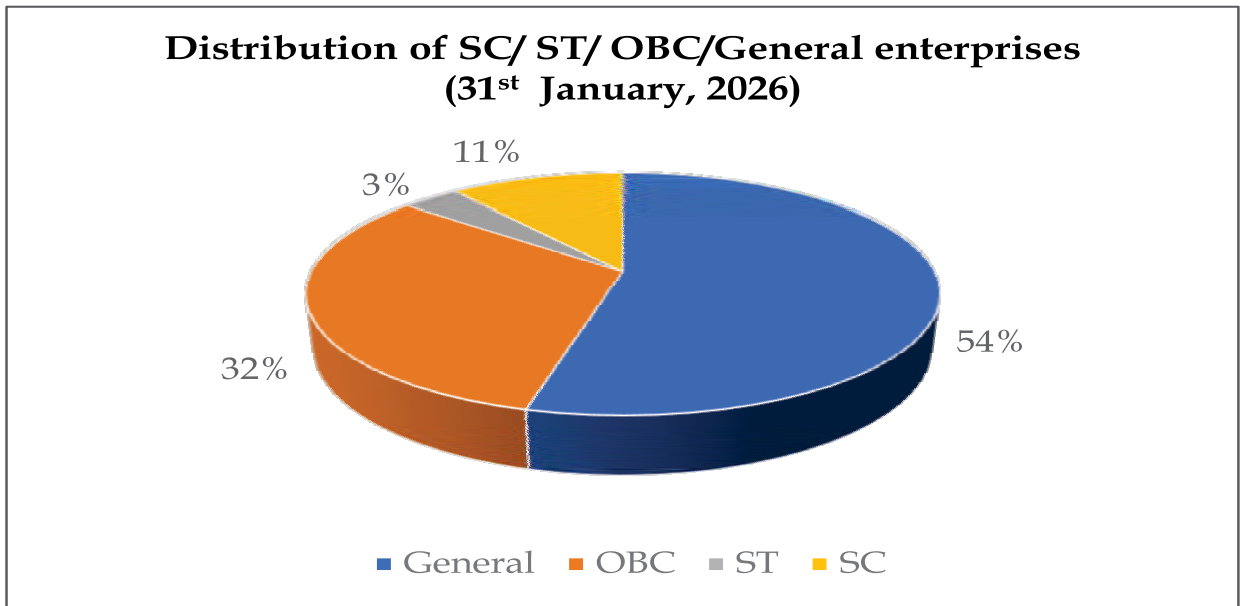

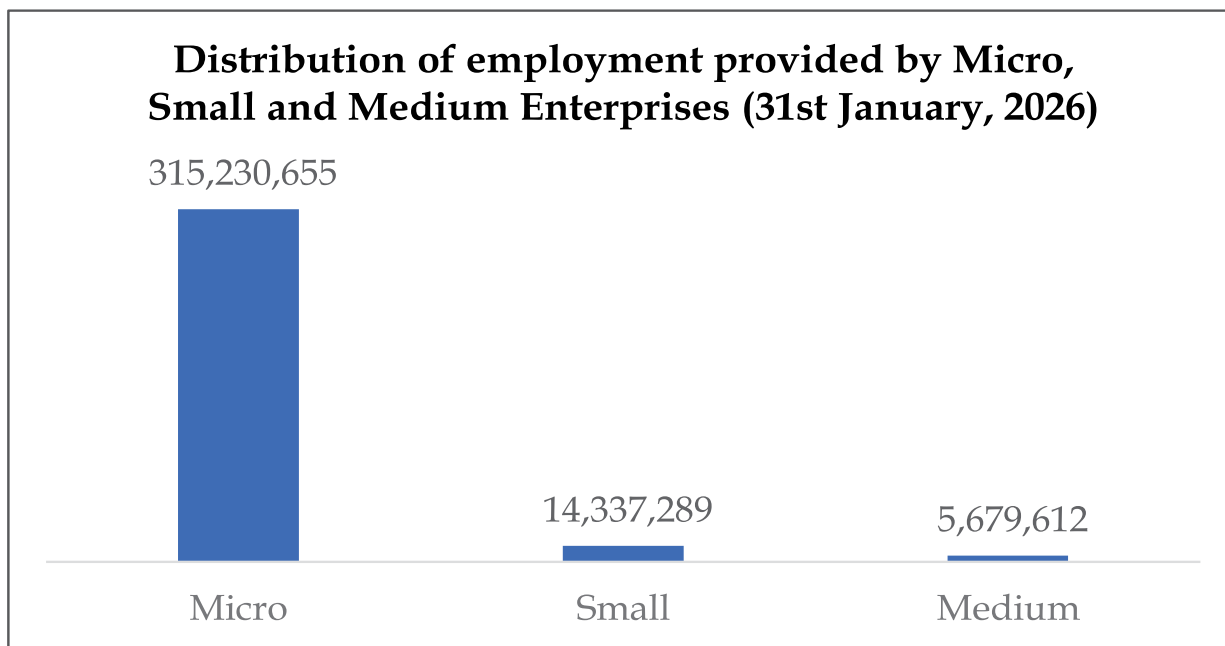

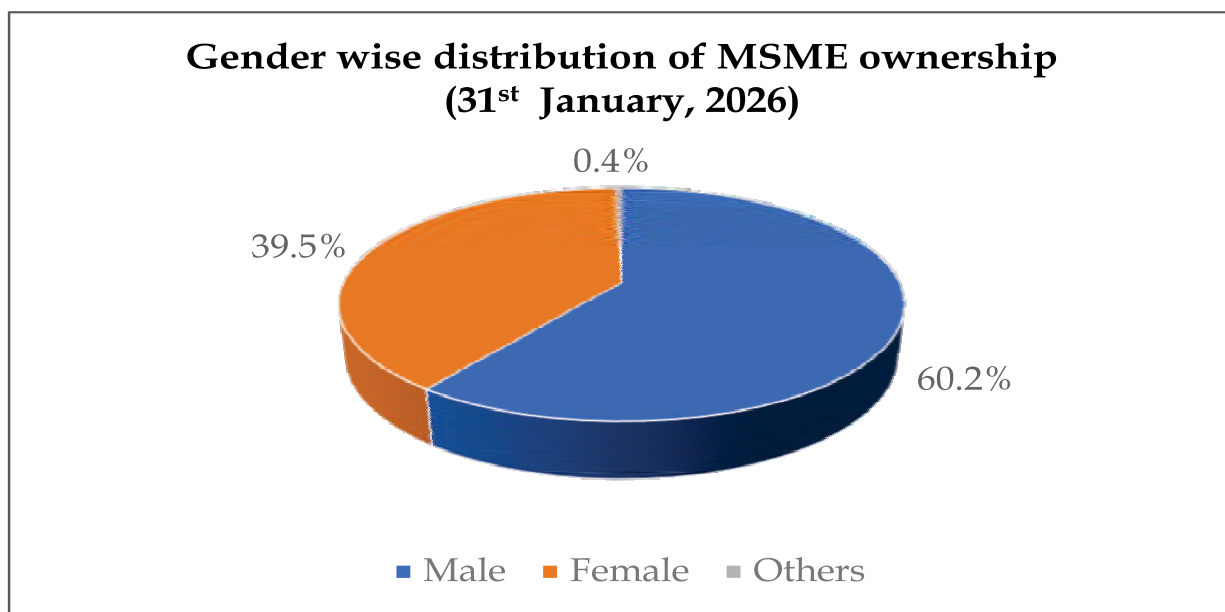

Figure 3.4: Distribution of employment provided by Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises



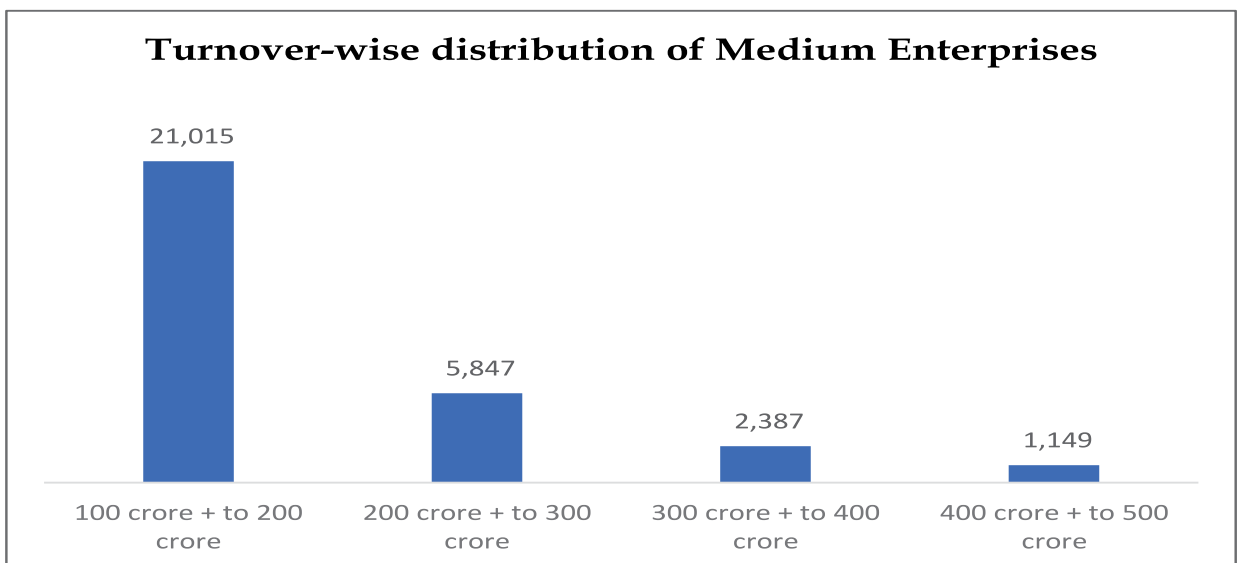
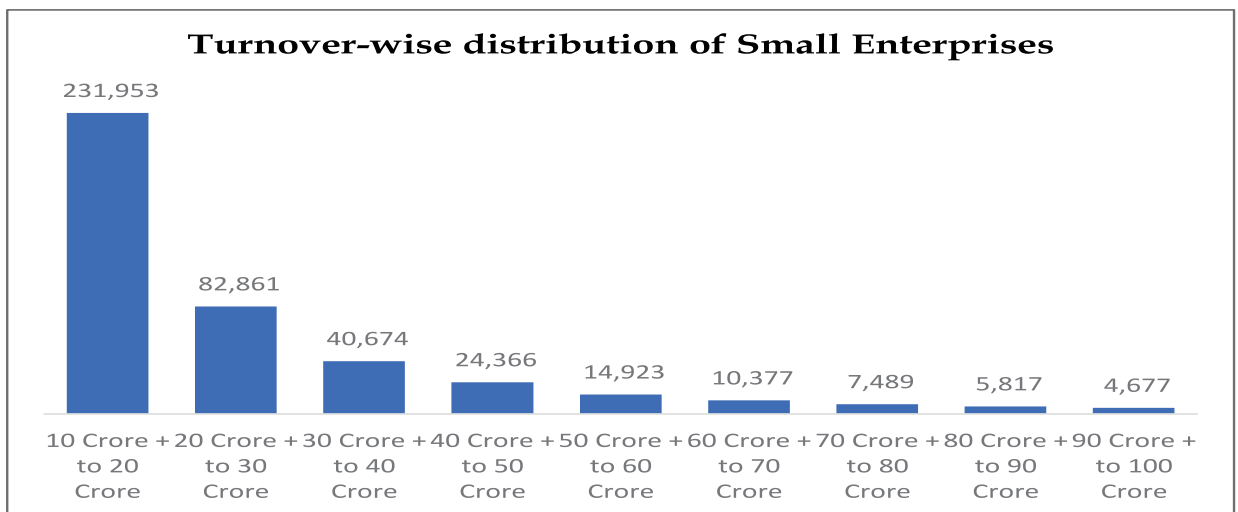
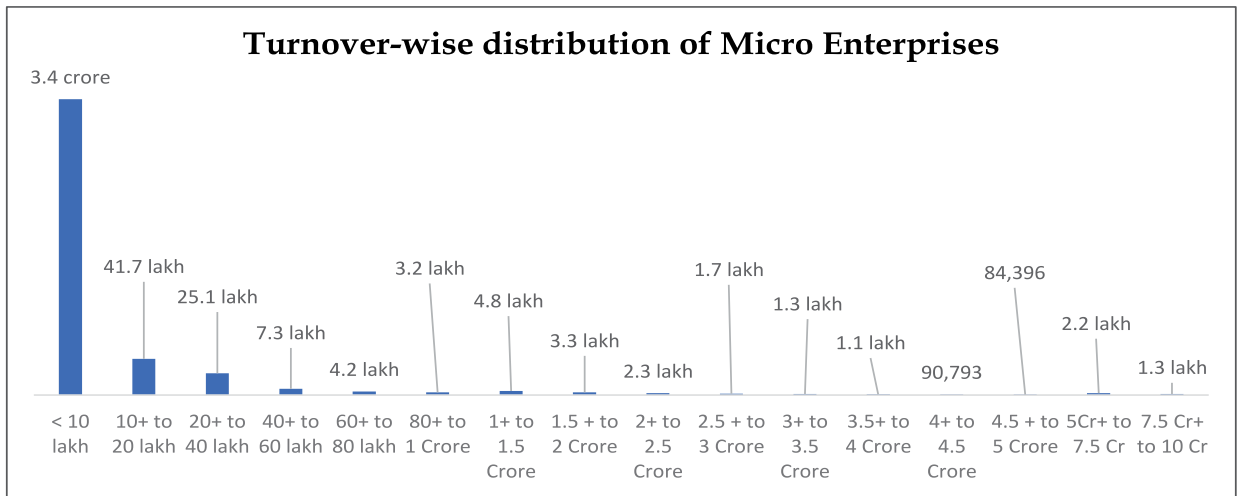

Figure 3.6: Turnover-wise distribution of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, as on 31st January, 2026.



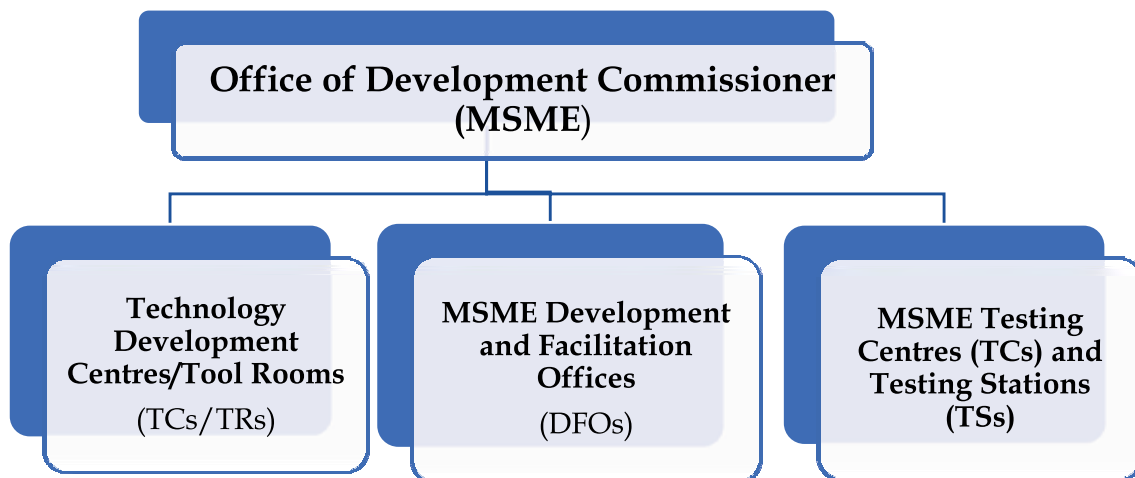

Introduction

Several organizations under Ministry of MSME support policy implementation and sectoral development. Key institutions include the **Office of the Development Commissioner (MSME), KVIC, Coir Board, NSIC, ni-msme, and MGIRI**, which contribute to entrepreneurship development, skill upgradation, employment generation, innovation, and promotion of rural and traditional industries, thereby supporting inclusive and sustainable growth of MSME sector.

4.1 Office of Development Commissioner (MSME)



Office of the Development Commissioner (MSME) is an attached office of the Ministry of MSME, headed by the Additional Secretary and Development Commissioner (MSME). Office of DC(MSME) assists Ministry of MSME in formulating, coordinating, implementing and monitoring various policies and programmes for the promotion and development of MSME with a network of field offices located across the country.

It has a vast network of field organizations and institutions across the country which includes 33 MSME Development and Facilitation Offices (MSME-DFOs), 31 Branch MSME-DFOs, 2 MSME Development Nucleus Cell (Ladakh and Lakshadweep), 7 MSME Testing Centres (MSME-TCs), 7 MSME-Testing Stations (MSME-TSs), 18 Technology Centres (also known as Tool Rooms and Technical Institutions (TRs and TIs).

4.1.1 Functions

The main services rendered by Development Commissioner (MSME) office are:

- Advising the government in policy formulation for the promotion and development of MSME.
- Providing techno-economic and managerial consultancy, common facilities and extension services to MSME.
- Providing facilities for technology upgradation, modernization, quality improvement and infrastructure.
- Developing Human Resources through training and skill upgradation.
- Facilitating cluster development as a vehicle for MSME Ecosystem development.
- Maintaining a close liaison with the Central Ministries, NITI Aayog, State Governments, Financial Institutions and other Organizations concerned with development of MSME.
- Evolving and coordinating Policies and Programmes for development of MSME as ancillaries to large industries including CPSUs.
- Enhancing trade competitiveness to ensure increase in share of export basket.
- Increasing access to credit.

4.1.2. Tool Rooms and Technical Institutions (TRs and TIs) (Also known as Technology Centres)

4.1.2.1 Ministry of MSME has established 18 Tool Rooms and Technical Institutions (TRs/TIs)—commonly known as Technology Centres (TCs)—between 1967 and 1999 to provide advanced technological support to industries. These Centres support the design and manufacture of tools, moulds, dies, and precision components across sectors such as general engineering, forging and foundry, electronics, electrical instruments, glass, footwear, sports goods, fragrance and flavour, and allied areas.

Several TCs also extend specialized support to strategic sectors including defence and aerospace. In addition to technology services and consultancy in tooling and manufacturing, TCs play a critical role in hands-on skill development, training unemployed youth and creating an industry-ready workforce. All 18 TCs function, as follows, act as autonomous, self-sustaining bodies under the Ministry of MSME

3. Indo German Tool Room (IGTR), Indore
4. Indo German Tool Room (IGTR), Ahmedabad

7. Central Tool Room and Training Centre (CTTC), Bhubaneswar

10. Central Institute of Tool Design (CITD), Hyderabad
11. Electronics Service and Training Centre (ESTC), Ramnagar
12. Institute for Design of Electrical Measuring Instruments (IDEMI), Mumbai.
13. Fragrance and Flavour Development Centre (FFDC), Kannauj.
14. Centre for the Development of Glass Industry (CDGI), Firozabad.
15. Process and Product Development Centre (PPDC), Agra.
16. Process cum Product Development Centre (PPDC), Meerut.
17. Central Footwear Training Institute (CFTI), Agra
18. Central Footwear Training Institute (CFTI), Chennai

These TCs are equipped with hi-end technologies. The Ministry supports these Centres by keeping them relevant and abreast with latest technology in their respective fields and periodically adding new technologies such as CNC machining, Vacuum Heat Treatment, 3D Printing, Robotics, CAD/CAM etc.

4.1.2.2 Some of the significant work done for industry, strategic sector and self-reliant under Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative are as given below:

- IGTR Aurangabad carried out machining of
 - (i) Various components for Chandrayaan Mission for ISRO, Ahmedabad
 - (ii) Articles of Light Combat Aircraft (LCA) TEJAS for M/s Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd. Nasik

4.1.2.3 TCs play a crucial role in providing critical skill development training to unemployed youth and industry workforce. The courses conducted by TCs are NSQF compliant, AICTE/ NCVET/ SCVT approved as well as customized courses as per the industry needs. Various NSQF courses have been developed in compliance with National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF). Students of 18 TRs and TIs are regularly participating in various Skill Competition programmes both at national and international level through these TRs and TIs.

4.1.2.4 All the TRs and TIs adhere to the principles of Total Quality Management (TQM). They are ISO 9001-2015 certified institutions and a few of them are ISO-14001, OHSAS-18001, ISO-29990, ISO/IEC17025:2017 and ISO-50001 certified. Central Tool Room and Training Centre, Bhubaneswar is also AS-9100 certified for Aero-space Component supply.

4.1.2.6. Technology Centre Systems Programme (TCSP)

To further augment the success of existing Technology Centres and expand their reach, Ministry of MSME initiated the Technology Centre Systems Programme (TCSP) with an estimated cost of ₹2,402 crore. The program aims to establish 15 new Technology Centres (TCs) and upgrade existing ones across the country. TCSP is designed to strengthen the competitiveness of MSME in key manufacturing industries by fostering an innovative ecosystem. 15 new Technology Centres are being established in the following States/UTs:

Key highlights:

- Civil Infrastructure of 9 TCs out of 15 TCs have been completed and dedicated to the Nation.
- 13 TCs have commenced training, consultancy and production support for MSME. The trainees trained under various short term and long-term industry oriented courses, since inception are 1,27,642 number whereas MSME assisted are 4,347 units. Under the current FY 2025-26 (till Dec 25), total 40,158 numbers of trainees have been trained whereas 1,241 units of MSME have been assisted.
- These new TCs have secured and executed production work-orders and consultancy services.
- 4 TCs at Puducherry, Durg, Bengaluru and Baddi are training Certified Master Trainers under Training of Trainers (ToT)/Training of Assessors (ToA) programs.

4.1.2.7. Establishment of new Technology Centres / Extension Centres

To expand and strengthen the existing Technology Centre ecosystem, Ministry of MSME is implementing the scheme “Establishment of New Technology Centres / Extension Centres” with an outlay of ₹3,500 crore. Under this initiative, 20 new Technology Centres (TCs) and 100 Extension Centres (ECs) are being established, in addition to 18 existing TCs and 15 TCs under the World Bank–assisted Technology Centre Systems Programme (TCSP).

The scheme aims to create a future-ready, pan-India network of TCs and ECs to enhance

MSME competitiveness by providing technology support, skilling, incubation, and consultancy services, thereby improving employability, fostering entrepreneurship, and enabling creation of new MSME.

The Centres are being developed under a Hub-and-Spoke model, wherein Extension Centres (Spokes) operate under a parent Technology Centre (Hub) for mentoring and administrative support. This model ensures wider regional coverage, including aspirational districts and the North Eastern Region (NER).

The proposed Centres will cater to key sectors such as General Engineering, Fragrance and Flavour, Electronics System Design and Manufacturing (ESDM), Sports, and other industry-relevant areas, while also strengthening industry-academia linkages and promoting innovation through advanced facilities, including incubation and emerging technologies such as AR/VR and AI.

Status of establishment of Technology Centres:

The location for 20 TCs have been approved till date and land for 16 locations is under possession of O/o DC (MSME). The possession of Land for 4 TCs is under process.

Status of establishment of Extension Centres

Under the scheme, 100 Extension Centers are to be established and 62 locations are approved for establishment of Extension Centres. Out of 62 approved locations for Extension Centres, 25 are operational and conducting training programmes and assisting MSME. The 25 Extension Centres (operational) have trained 1,40,468 trainees and assisted 2979 MSME, till 31st December, 2025

4.1.3. Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises Development and Facilitation Offices (MSME-DFOs)

4.1.3.1. MSME- Development and Facilitation Office

MSME-DFOs are the field offices of the Development Commissioner (MSME), Ministry of MSME, providing last-mile support to MSME across States/UTs. At present, there are 33 MSME-DFOs, 31 Branch DFOs and 2 MSME Development Nucleus Cells (Ladakh and Lakshadweep). These offices are manned by officers of Indian Enterprise Development Service (IEDS), supported by Indian Economic Service (IES) and Indian Statistical Services (ISS) cadres.

MSME-DFOs facilitate MSME access to finance, technology, infrastructure, registration and Government schemes, including Udyam Registration, GeM, GST, IPR, Design, Incubation, Lean, MSE-CDP, Procurement and Marketing Support, PM Vishwakarma, ESDP and Public Procurement Policy. They also coordinate with DICs, KVIC, NSIC and State Government agencies for MSME development.

4.1.3.2. Strengthening of Institutional Capacity: Induction of 65 IEDS Officers

4.1.3.2.1. Following the implementation of the newly constituted IEDS cadre, the induction of 65 officers in 2025 (29 Assistant Directors Grade-I and 36 Assistant Directors Grade-II) marks the first-ever batch recruited through Direct Recruitment by the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC), representing a significant strengthening of the Ministry's institutional framework.

4.1.3.2.2. To orient and equip newly inducted officers with knowledge, skills, and vision required to strengthen India's MSME ecosystem, Ministry conducted a two-week residential Induction Training Programme from 6th to 17th October 2025 at IIT Roorkee Greater Noida Extension Centre. The programme was designed to build administrative, policy, and technical competencies to enhance effective implementation and service delivery within the MSME sector.

4.1.3.3. Consultancy and Technical support

MSME-DFOs provide techno-economic consultancy services covering:

- Product identification and development
- Selection of suitable machinery
- Industrial designing Modernization
- Preparation of project profiles and project evaluation
- Technical support services
- Promotional programme for small enterprises including environmental projects
- Upgradation / modernization of MSE Units

- Interface between Centre and State Government
- Market and Industrial potential servicing Product development

4.1.3.4. Market Research

MSME-DFOs support industrial development through:

- Identification of products for setting up of new MSME Units
- Preparation of Industry prospect
- Industrial potential survey
- Appraisal of projects for their techno economic viability
- Market survey and feasibility report
- Creating Awareness besides regular development activities

4.1.3.5. Coordination and Implementation

MSME-DFOs play a key role in:

- Implementation of MSME schemes and services
- Advising Government on MSME policy matters
- Liaison with Central Ministries, State Governments, banks and institution
- Coordinating MSME integration into industrial supply chains.

4.1.3.6. Cluster Development Activity

Under the MSE-Cluster Development Programme, MSME-DFOs provide techno-managerial support for:

- Addressing common cluster issues relating to technology, skills, quality and market access
- Capacity building through SHGs, consortia and industry associations
- Creation/upgradation of industrial infrastructure and Common Facility Centres
- Promotion of green and sustainable manufacturing practices.

4.1.3.7. Project Profiles

MSME-DFOs prepare project profiles for viable micro and small enterprises, detailing product specifications, manufacturing process, capital and manpower requirements, market potential, and sources of machinery and raw materials. These profiles are hosted on the respective DFO websites.

4.1.3.8. District Industrial Potential Survey Reports

MSME-DFOs prepare District Industrial Potential Survey Reports and District Development Plans, including for Aspirational Districts, to identify MSME growth opportunities.

4.1.3.9. Assistance to MSME in Accessing Finance

MSME-DFOs facilitate MSME credit flow by:

- Participating in State Level Bankers Committee (SLBC), District Level Review Committee (DLRC) and RBI Empowered Committee meetings
- Taking up MSME credit issues and grievances with banks and regulators
- Handling credit-related grievances through the CHAMPIONS Portal
- Conducting quarterly credit facilitation programmes through Entrepreneur Development Cells (EDCs)
- Providing model project reports and guidance for bank finance.

4.1.3.10. Implementation of PM Vishwakarma Scheme:

Under the PM Vishwakarma Scheme, MSME-DFOs are responsible for beneficiary registration, screening and final approval through district-level committees. They also coordinate with Central Ministries, State Governments, implementing agencies and CGTMSE to ensure effective rollout of the Scheme at the grassroots level.

4.1.4. MSME Testing Centres and Testing Stations

The Office of the Development Commissioner (MSME), Ministry of MSME has established seven MSME Testing Centres (TCs) at New Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai, Kolkata, Ahmedabad, Patna and Dimapur. These Centres provide testing and calibration services to industries, with a special focus on MSME, covering raw materials, semi-finished and finished products. The Centres are operated by officers of the IEDS cadre.

To extend testing facilities to industrial clusters and strategic locations, the Ministry set up seven MSME Testing Stations (TSSs) in 1982 at Jaipur, Bhopal, Kolhapur, Hyderabad, Bengaluru, Puducherry and Ettumanur. These Testing Stations function as extensions of MSME Testing Centres, catering to MSME in far-flung areas and are periodically upgraded to meet evolving industry requirements.

The Testing Centres are equipped with state-of-the-art indigenous and imported equipment in chemical, mechanical, metallurgical and electrical disciplines, enabling performance, type and acceptance testing, as well as calibration of measuring instruments and equipment in conformity with national and international standards.

4.1.4.1. MSME Testing Centres- Key Features

- Provide testing facilities for raw materials, semi-finished and finished products to

industries, with special focus on MSME.

- Offer calibration services for measuring instruments and equipment in conformity with international standards.
- Support MSME in product quality upgradation through technical assistance.
- Conduct training programmes on product-specific testing and quality control to enable MSME to develop in-house testing capabilities.
- Support BIS standardization efforts by facilitating testing for obtaining BIS licence / quality marking.
- Undertake testing of materials procured by Government Departments such as Railways, Defence and CPWD from MSME.
- Provide consultancy services in testing, quality management and in-process quality systems.

4.1.4.2. Services other than Testing and Calibration rendered by MSME - Testing Centres/ Testing Stations.

- Provide technical support to MSME for quality upgradation of manufactured products.
- Offer consultancy services in testing, quality management and in-process quality systems.
- Impart skill training to youth in product testing for employment in Quality Control laboratories.
- Conduct product-specific training programmes for MSME-sponsored workers to enable creation of in-house testing facilities.
- Organize awareness programmes on Total Quality Management (TQM), ISO-9000 Quality Management Systems, and quality standards for electrical and allied products.

4.2. Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC)

The Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC), established under the Khadi and Village Industries Commission Act, 1956, is a statutory body under the Ministry of MSME, engaged in promotion and development of Khadi and Village Industries, with the primary goal of creating employment opportunities in rural areas and bolstering the rural economy. As a key organization in the decentralized sector, KVIC plays a pivotal role in generating sustainable non-farm employment at lower per capita investment. Its activities include skill development, technology transfer, research and development, marketing, and generation of employment and self-employment opportunities in rural regions.

4.2.1. Main Objectives

The main objectives of KVIC include:-

- i. Providing employment opportunities in rural areas, and in urban areas through District Industries Centers (DIC);
- ii. Producing saleable articles to drive economic growth; and
- iii. Promoting self-reliance among individuals and building up a strong rural community spirit.

4.2.2. Functions

The major functions of KVIC as provided under the KVIC Act, 1956 include: -

- i. to plan and organize training of persons employed or desirous of seeking employment in Khadi and Village Industries;
- ii. to build up directly or through specified agencies reserves of raw materials and implements and supply them or arrange supply of raw materials and implements to persons engaged or likely to be engaged in production of handspun yarn or Khadi or Village Industries at such rates as the Commission may decide;
- iii. to encourage and assist in the creation of common service facilities for the processing of raw materials or semi-finished goods and otherwise facilitate production and marketing of Khadi or products of Village Industries;
- iv. to promote the sale and marketing of Khadi or products of Village Industries or handicrafts and for this purpose forge links with established marketing agencies wherever necessary and feasible;
- v. to encourage and promote research in the technology used in Khadi and Village Industries, including the use of non-conventional energy and electric power with a view to increasing productivity, eliminating drudgery and otherwise enhancing their competitive capacity and to arrange for dissemination of salient results obtained from such research;
- vi. to provide financial assistance directly or through specified agencies to Institutions or

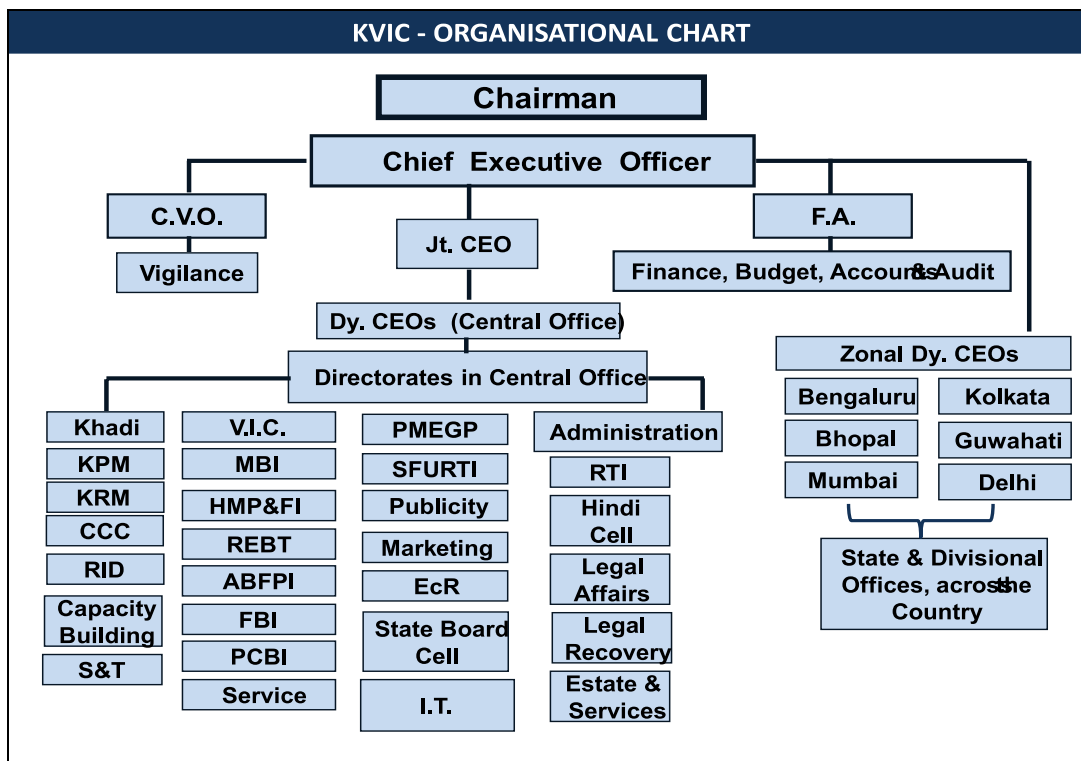
persons engaged in the development and operation of Khadi or Village Industries and guide them through supply of designs, prototypes and other technical information, for the purpose of producing goods and services for which there is effective demand in the opinion of the Commission;

- vii. to ensure genuineness and to set up standards of quality and ensure that products of Khadi and Village Industries do conform to the said standards, including issue of certificates or letters of recognition to the concerned persons.

4.2.3. Organization

4.2.3.1. The Commission functions with its Head Office at Mumbai and six Zonal Offices located at New Delhi, Bhopal, Bengaluru, Kolkata, Mumbai and Guwahati and 44 State/Divisional/Sub Offices, spread all across the country.

4.2.3.2. The Organizational Chart of KVIC is given below.



4.2.3.3 KVIC conducts training programs through its network of 35 Departmental and Non-Departmental Training Centres, empowering individuals with the skills needed to thrive in Khadi and Village Industries. The marketing of products crafted by Khadi and Village Industries Institutions and Units, as well as Khadi Gramodyog Bhawans and Bhandars, is facilitated through an extensive network. This includes 8 Departmental Sales Outlets (Khadi India), 15 branches of KVIC, and 8,035 sales outlets operated by Khadi Institutions across the country. Additionally, KVIC ensures the availability of high-quality raw materials to Khadi Institutions through its five Central Sliver Plants (CSPs).

4.2.3.4. The Khadi and Village Industries (KVI) programmes are implemented through 34 State and Union Territory (UT) Khadi and Village Industries Boards (KVIBs) and Registered KVI Institutions. The Khadi programme, in particular, is executed by institutions registered either with the KVIC or the respective State/UT KVIBs.

4.2.4. Initiatives to Promote Khadi and Village Industries

Initiatives taken by KVIC to promote Khadi and Village Industries are as below:

- In order to increase earnings of artisans, KVIC has increased the spinning wages from ₹ 12.50/- per hank to ₹ 15.00/- per hank and weaving wages by 20% w.e.f. 01.04.2025.
- KVIC has set up Marino Wool Bank at Bikaner, Rajasthan to cater the raw material needs of Khadi Institution.
- A new software application has been designed and developed for the benefit of Central Sliver Plants (CSPs) to record their supply of raw material (sliver/roving) to the Khadi Institutions (KIs).
- In order to ease out the problem of manual budget, KVIC has designed, developed and launched an online Budgeting System for Khadi Institutions (KIs) enabling the KIs to submit their Budget with all detailed information like performance achievement of the previous year and action plan for the budget year.
- To enhance quality ecosystem in Khadi Sector, KVIC entered in an MoU with Quality Council of India (Ministry of Commerce) for extending intervention in the quality supply chain from Raw Material to finished goods (farm to fashion).
- A new activity of 'Popcorn Making' was added under Agro Based and Food Processing Industry (ABFPI) vertical of Gramodyog Vikas Yojana.
- Pashmina wool processing unit in Leh was inaugurated, ensuring that Pashmina wool roving is readily available to local Khadi artisans for the production of Pashmina woolen yarn.
- KVIC signed an MoU with National Small Industries Corporation Limited (NSIC) for creating an ecosystem to facilitate enhanced market access through Government as a whole approach.
- With a view to energise the spirit of 'Vocal for Local' and 'Atmanirbhar Bharat', Khadi Mahotsav was organized throughout the country from 17.09.2025 to 23.10.2025 with an aim to promote Khadi and Village Industries products with the tag line "**Har Ghar Swadeshi Ghar Ghar Swadeshi**". Under Khadi Mahotsav, various promotional, educational and awareness activities such as Khadi Yatras, various sales campaigns, Exhibitions, multiple seminars etc. were taken up by KVIC.
- Special events participated in by the Commission are detailed in the section titled "Special Events during the Year" in Chapter 2 of the Report.

4.2.5. Khadi Sector in India

4.2.5.1. Khadi activity is widely regarded as a powerful tool for generating employment opportunities for rural artisans at their doorstep with minimal capital investment. Following India's independence, the productivity of Khadi and Village Industries became a profound symbol of nationalism. Consequently, Khadi transcended its identity as mere fabric to become a representation of freedom and self-reliance.

4.2.5.2. KVICs, extensive network includes over 2,985 Khadi Institutions implementing various KVIC programmes across India. This initiative provides livelihoods to more than 5 lakh people, with women artisans constituting over 80 percent of the workforce.

4.2.5.3. Khadi sector has witnessed consistent growth in sales over the years. Sales figures for the past five years and current year 2025-26 (up to December, 2025) are as follows:

4.2.6. Khadi Vikas Yojana

Khadi Vikas Yojana (KVY) is a sub-scheme of umbrella scheme of Khadi Gramodyog Vikas Yojana (KGVY) and is being implemented by KVIC for the promotion and development of Khadi.

The KVY scheme's major components are as follows:

1. Modified Market Development Assistance (MMDA):

Key Highlights:

- The Government of India introduced the "Modified Market Development Assistance" (MMDA) scheme w.e.f., 3rd Quarter of 2016 - 17.
- Modified MDA Scheme aims at decontrolling and de-linking the sales price from the Cost Chart, thus offering scope to the Institutions to add value to Khadi; so that the products can be sold at market-oriented prices.
- Modified Market Development Assistance (MMDA) for Cotton/Muslin, Wool and Polyvastra shall be calculated @ 35% on Prime Cost and for Silk Khadi @ 20% on Prime Cost which includes cost of raw material plus conversion charges upto grey cloth plus processing charges without margins.

Achievements:

- During 2024-25, ₹ 245.00 Crore was disbursed to 1,097 Khadi Institutions and 1,45,484 artisans benefited under MMDA.

- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31-12- 2025), ₹ 137.35 Crore has been disbursed to 935 Khadi Institutions under MMDA.

2. Interest Subsidy Eligibility Certificate (ISEC) Scheme:

Key Highlights:

- Launched in May, 1977 for Khadi Institutions to mobilize additional requirements of fund from the Financial Institutions / Banks.
- The ISEC Scheme is applicable for all registered Khadi Institutions under KVIC / KVIB implementing Khadi and Polyvastra programme. Under the scheme, credit at the concessional rate of Interest @ 4% per annum is given for Capital Expenditure (CE) as well as for Working Capital (WC), as per the requirement of KVI Institutions. The difference between the actual lending rate and 4% is paid by the Central Government through Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) to the lending Banks, and the funds for this purpose are provided under the Khadi Vikas Yojana Grant head to KVIC.

Achievements:

- During 2024 - 25, ₹ 39.00 Crores was disbursed towards interest subsidy to 1,146 Khadi Institutions; under ISEC.
- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31.12.2025), ₹ 28.21 Crore has been disbursed to 1,121 Khadi Institutions; under ISEC.

3. Work-shed Scheme for Khadi Artisans

Key Highlights:

- “Work-shed Scheme for Khadi Artisans” was introduced in 2008 - 09 to envisage providing sufficient space and congenial environment to Khadi artisans for smooth and fatigue free working; leading to enhanced productivity and increased earning.
- Under the scheme, financial assistance up to ₹1,20,000/- for construction of Individual Work shed and up to ₹ 80,000/- per artisans for Group work-shed is provided.

Achievements:

- During the year, 2024- 25, 1,497 Khadi Artisans were benefitted under this Work-shed Scheme.
- During 2025-26 (upto 31-12-2025), 1,309 Khadi Artisans were benefitted under this Work-shed Scheme.

4. Strengthening of Infrastructure of Existing Weak Khadi Institutions and Assistance for Marketing Infrastructure

Key Highlights:

- The scheme is a combination of two sub schemes namely “Strengthening of Infrastructure

of Existing Weak Khadi Institutions” and “Assistance for Marketing Infrastructure”.

- Under the scheme, Strengthening of Infrastructure of Existing Weak Khadi Institutions; assistance up to ₹ 15.00 Lakh is provided to Weak or Problematic Khadi Institutions to bring back their activities to normalcy.
- Assistance up to ₹ 25.00 Lakh was provided for developing marketing infrastructure, viz., common logo, signage, visual merchandising, computerization including billing and bar-coding, training of sales staff, furniture and fixture including civil works incidental to renovation, etc., to Khadi Institutions, sales outlets of KVIBs and Departmental Sales Outlets.

Achievements:

- During 2024 - 25, 34 Khadi Institutions were strengthened. Further, 79 sales outlets of Khadi Institutions have been renovated under Assistance for Marketing Infrastructure.
- During 2025-26, upto (31-12-2025), 29 Khadi Institutions have been strengthened. Further, 04 sales outlets of Khadi Institutions have been renovated under Assistance for Marketing Infrastructure.

4.2.7. Village Industries

"Village Industry' means any industry located in a rural area that produces any goods or renders any service with or without the use of power in which the fixed capital investment per head of an artisan or a worker does not exceed ₹1.00 Lakh in plain areas and ₹1.50 Lakhs in hilly areas or such other sum maybe by notification in the official gazette, be specified from time to time by the Central Government.

Key highlights and achievements of major activities of GVY are as under

1. Honey Mission

Key Highlights:

- Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) is engaged in the development of the

beekeeping industry with a view to uplift people living in extremely interior rural areas by introducing and popularizing modern beekeeping and creating sustainable employment and income.

- Hon'ble Prime Minister announced that "श्वेतक्रांति के साथ-साथ स्वीट क्रांति की भी जरूरत है।" Inspired by this vision, Ministry of MSME accorded approval for Honey Mission.

Achievements:

- Since inception, up to 31-12- 2025, a total of 2,27,449 Bee Hives (Boxes) with Bee Colonies were distributed to 22,864 Beekeepers under Honey Mission programme.
- During 2024 - 25, 17,950 Bee Hives (Boxes) with Bee Colonies were distributed to 1,795 Beekeepers under Honey Mission programme.
- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31 - 12 - 2025), 400 Bee Hives (Boxes) with Bee Colonies were distributed to 40 Beekeepers under Honey Mission programme.

2. Kumbar Sashaktikaran Programme

Key Highlights:

- Under Mineral Based Industry, Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) distributed Electric Pottery Wheels along-with other tools and equipments to the Pottery artisans, for strengthening Potter families engaged in Pottery.

Achievements:

- Since inception, up to 31-12-2025, a total of 43,486 Electric Pottery Wheels, and other equipment's were distributed to Pottery artisans under Kumhar Sashaktikaran programme and 1,58,776 employments were generated.
- During 2024-25, 8,723 Electric Pottery Wheels and other equipment were distributed to Pottery artisans under Kumbar Sashaktikaran programme and 34,892 employments were generated.
- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31-12-2025), 8,912 Electric Pottery Wheels are purchased, out of which 3,792 Electric Pottery Wheels were distributed to Pottery artisans.

3. Science and Technology

Key Highlights:

- KVIC has been functioning with the vision of boosting and injecting innovation, quality and productivity to make the Khadi and Village Industries products globally competitive and also to enable rural industries get its due to market demand.
- KVIC has made stringent efforts to address quality aspects, and promote research and development through Research and Development projects, and ISO 9001 - 2015 Certification.

- Research and Development activities are continuously exploring and implemented in the area of technology by providing scientific input to needy Institutions with an objective to increase the productivity and quality of the product through reputed Scientific Institutions.

Achievements:

- During 2024 - 25, 01 Research and Development Projects under Khadi and 04 Research and Development Projects under Village Industries assisted under Science and Technology.
- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31 - 03 - 2026), 13 projects are expected to be assisted under Khadi and Village Industries proposal under Science and Technology.

4. Capacity Building

Key Highlights:

- Khadi and Village Industries Commission conduct training programmes through 35 Departmental and Non-Departmental Training Centres. These Training Centres imparts need base training under various disciplines, viz., Soap and Detergent Making, Food Items, Bakery Products, Ready Made Garments Making, Beekeeping, Agarbatti Making, Candle making, Motor Repairing, Binding, etc.

Achievements:

- During 2024-25, 93,739 trainees were trained.
- During 2025 - 26 (up to 31-12-2025), 44,711 trainees were trained.

4.3. COIR BOARD

4.3.1. Introduction

Coir Board is a statutory body established under the Coir Industry Act, 1953 for promoting the overall development of coir industry in India. The Head Quarters of the Board is located at Coir House, M.G. Road, Kochi, Kerala. The Board is running 45 establishments including 24 Showrooms and Sales Depots in various parts of the country. There are a total number of 207 employees under the Board.

4.3.2. Objective

The main objective of the Board is promoting the overall development of the coir industry and improvement of living conditions of the workers engaged in this traditional industry.

4.3.3. Functions

Key functions of the Coir Board include:

- Undertaking, assisting or encouraging scientific, technological and economic research and maintaining and assisting in the maintenance of one or more research institutes;
- Promoting exports of coir yarn and coir products and carrying on propaganda for that purpose.
- Regulating under the supervision of the Central Government the production of husks, coir yarn and coir products by registering coir spindles and looms for manufacturing coir products as also manufacturers of coir products, licensing exporters of coir, coir yarn and coir products and taking such other appropriate steps as may be prescribed;
- Licensing of retting places and warehouses and otherwise regulating the stocking and sales of coir fibre, coir yarn and coir products both for the internal market and for exports.
- Advising on all matters relating to the development of the coir industry.

4.3.4. Coir Industry in India

India is the largest producer of Coir and Coir Products in the world, accounting for more than 70% of the total production. The coir sector in India is very diverse and involves households, co-operatives, NGOs, manufacturers and exporters. The coir industry employs about 7 lakh people, of whom majority are from rural areas belonging to the economically weaker sections of the society. Nearly 80% of the coir workers are women. Originating as a traditional agro-based industry in Kerala, the coir sector has expanded to other coconut-producing states such as Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, West Bengal, Maharashtra, Assam, and Tripura. With its rich heritage and export-oriented focus, the coir industry holds significant potential for growth through value addition and technological advancements.

4.3.5. Schemes implemented by Coir Board

4.3.5.1. Coir Vikas Yojana (CVY)

Coir Board implements the umbrella scheme “Coir Vikas Yojana (CVY)” aimed at promoting sustainable development, growth and support for coir artisans and coir industry all over the country. The Coir Vikas Yojana has been approved for the current EFC from FY 2021-22 to FY 2025-26 with an overall outlay of Rs 466.60 crore. The major components and activities undertaken under CVY are as under:

4.3.5.2. Science and Technology

Science and Technology component of CVY is implemented through the Coir Board’s research institutes—CCRI, Alappuzha, and CICT, Bengaluru, to modernize the coir industry by improving productivity, quality, and product diversification. Research and Development efforts focus on process modernization, machinery and product development, eco-friendly technologies, and technology transfer, including incubation, testing, and support services. Key initiatives under Science and Technology component during the period of report include:

- i. Collaborative project with Reva University, Bengaluru on Coir-based carbon materials for sustainable energy applications
- ii. Development of Power Loom machine to Weave Thin Variety of Blended Coir Fabrics
- iii. Coir Yarn Spinning Machine using Drafting Mechanism capable of producing yarn with reduced hairiness and uniform thickness and Miniature Tabletop Weaving Device

4.3.5.3. Skill Upgradation Programmes and Mahila Coir Yojana

Skill development is a core focus of the Coir Board and is implemented through its Field Level Establishments nationwide. Under the Skill Development Scheme, training is provided on value-added products, coir yarn spinning under Mahila Coir Yojana (MCY), entrepreneurship development, and related promotional activities. During the period under report, 1,478 artisans were trained and 70 stipendiary promotional programmes were conducted across various States. Details for FY 2025-26 (as on 31.12.2025) are given below.

a) Mahila Coir Yojana (MCY)

Implemented since 1994, MCY is a women-centric self-employment scheme aimed at providing sustainable rural livelihoods through household-level coir yarn spinning on

motorized ratts. The scheme has enhanced productivity, quality, working conditions, and income levels of women artisans. The two-month training is stipendiary, and during the period under report, 635 women artisans were trained.



- b) **Training in Manufacturing of Value Added Products (VAP)** - During the period under report, the Board has imparted training in manufacturing of Value Added Products to 792 Nos. of coir artisans.
- c) **Entrepreneurship Development Programme (EDP):** The EDPs are conducted in three days session for the benefits of entrepreneurs in coir sector to enable entrepreneurs to run their establishment in a smooth and effective manner by monitoring the key aspects like resource management, financial discipline, productivity and profitability. During the period under report, the Board has conducted 24 Nos. of EDPs through the Regional and Sub Regional Offices under the Board.
- d) **National/ State/ Regional Level Seminar** - National, State, and Regional level seminars were conducted on topics related to the coir industry, including Coir Board schemes such as CVY, PMEGP, SFURTI, and relevant technologies. During the period under report, the Board conducted six seminars through its Regional Offices in Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, and Maharashtra.



- e) **Exposure Tour** : Exposure tours were organized to expose prospective entrepreneurs and artisans to the functioning of coir units and diverse methods of coir and coir product manufacturing, with four tours conducted during the period under report.
- f) **Awareness Programme:** Information on the schemes and services of the Coir Board and the Ministry of MSME, including eligibility criteria, was disseminated through 28 awareness programmes conducted during the reporting period.



4.3.5.4. Export Market Promotion

The Coir Board plays a pivotal role in promoting Indian coir products in global markets, with a focus on empowering small-scale exporters and expanding the export potential of this eco-friendly natural fibre. Its key activities include registration of coir exporters, facilitation of participation of Coir-based MSME in international exhibitions, assistance under the International Cooperation Scheme, and conferment of Coir Industry Awards to recognize excellence. Through these initiatives, the Board encourages MSME to access global markets while positioning coir as a sustainable alternative to synthetic materials.

Achievements during the period:

1. International Exhibitions in 2025 in which Coir Board participated:

i	<p>GARDEX-2025 - Coir Board organized India’s participation in GARDEX-2025, held at Chiba, Japan from 1–3 October 2025. The Indian Coir Pavilion was inaugurated by Mr. R. Madhu Sudan, Charge d’Affaires, Embassy of India, Tokyo, who appreciated in showcasing of sustainable natural fibre products and offered strategic suggestions to enhance export reach and global competitiveness.</p>

- ii. **37th Edition Sahara Exhibition 2025, Egypt** - Coir Board participated in the 37th Sahara Exhibition held at the Egypt International Exhibition Centre, Cairo from 14–16 September 2025, along with 11 co-exhibitors. H.E. Alaa Farouk, Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture and Land Reclamation, Egypt, interacted with exporters and expressed keen interest in the application of coir pith and grow bags in greenhouse farming. Discussions highlighted the role of coir products in sustainability, water retention, productivity, and land reclamation.



- iii. **International Floriculture Trade Fair (IFTF)** - Coir Board organized participation in IFTF-2025, held in the Netherlands from 1–4 November 2025, with twelve MSME under its aegis. Led by Smt. Geetha Bhoir, Zonal Director, Coir Board, the Indian delegation showcased innovative coir-based products for agricultural and horticultural applications, including erosion-control mats, coir geotextiles, planters, and other bio-based landscaping products.

In addition to participation in IITF, 2025, PM Vishwakarma and National SC-ST Hub Conclave, Odisha, the Board participated in various other exhibitions including MSME Industrial Expo 2025, details are as follows:

MSME Industrial Expo 2025 - The Board participated in MSME Industrial Expo 2025 held at Kota, Rajasthan from 18–20 April 2025. The event was inaugurated by Hon’ble Speaker, Lok Sabha, Shri Om Birla, and was graced by Hon’ble Minister of State for MSME, Sushri Shobha Karandlaje, Hon’ble Minister for Education and Panchayati Raj, Government of Rajasthan, Shri Madan Dilawar and Hon’ble Minister for Energy, Government of Rajasthan, Shri Hiralal Nagar.

4.4 The National Small Industries Corporation (NSIC) Limited

4.4.1 The National Small Industries Corporation Ltd. (NSIC) is an ISO 9001-2015 certified Government of India Enterprise under Ministry of MSME. NSIC has been working to promote aid and foster the growth of micro, small and medium enterprises in the country.

4.4.2 Objective

Mission: To promote and support MSME by providing integrated support services encompassing, Marketing, Finance, Technology and other Services

Vision: To be premier organization fostering the growth of MSME in the country

4.4.3 Organization

NSIC is governed by a Board comprising a Chairman-cum-Managing Director, Functional Directors, Government Nominee Directors and Independent Directors. The Corporation operates through a nationwide network of offices, 8 Technical Services Centres and Training-cum-Incubation Centres, delivering end-to-end enterprise support.

4.4.4 Operating Performance:

a) Raw Material Distribution (RMD)

NSIC facilitates assured and timely availability of raw materials to MSME through MoU with bulk manufacturers and regional suppliers, ensuring cost efficiency and uninterrupted supply.

➤ During the period from 1st January,2025 to 31st Dec.,2025, NSIC has signed more than 20 MoUs with Regional Producers/Local suppliers for supply of raw materials to MSME. NSIC has initiated the distribution of customised steel materials to MSME in collaboration with reputed local manufacturers/ suppliers, yielding significant results.

➤ During the period, the quantity of the raw material distributed was 3,64,374.60 MTs amounting to ₹3,089.13 crore.

b) Credit Support

NSIC extends short-term credit for raw material procurement and trade receivables through Bank Guarantee-backed mechanisms.

➤ During the period 1st January,2025 to 31st Dec.,2025, 09 MoUs have been signed with banks and

➤ Credit support provided to more than 2,482 MSME units amounting to ₹8,656.56 crore under Raw Material Assistance (RMA)

c) Bill Discounting Scheme

NSIC facilitates timely liquidity to MSME by discounting bills arising from genuine trade transactions with reputed Public Limited Companies, Central and State Government Departments, PSUs and eligible Private Limited Companies engaged in manufacturing or services.

➤ During the period from 1st January, 2025 to 31st Dec.,2025, total bills amounting to ₹87.79 crore were discounted against Bank Guarantee.

➤ During the reported period, NSIC extended Credit Support worth ₹83.34 crore under TReDS.

d) NSIC Technical Services Centers

NSIC provides technology support to MSME through its eight NSIC Technical Services Centres (NTSCs) located at Okhla (New Delhi), Hyderabad, Howrah, Rajkot, Chennai, Rajpura, Aligarh and Neemka.

i. Demand Driven — Industries Centric Trainings in the areas of Hi-skills and Conventional Trades.

ii. Common Facility Services for Technical Consultancy and Job works on conventional to Hi-Tech Machines and Testing facilities through NSBL accredited and BIS recognized laboratories.

e) Skill development

NSIC Technical Services Centres provide job-oriented, industry-driven skill development training across multiple disciplines using conventional to hi-tech machinery and equipment. During the reported period, 86,098 trainees were trained, generating ₹24.44 crore in revenue.

f) E-Marketing/ Digital Services facilitation for MSME

NSIC facilitates e-marketing for MSME through MSME Global Mart Portal (www.msmemart.com), providing enhanced market access. During the reported period, 10,905 MSME were onboarded, generating ₹5.78 crore in revenue.

4.5 National Institute for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (ni-msme)

ni-msme was originally set up as Central Industrial Extension Training Institute (CIETI) in New Delhi in 1960 under the then Ministry of Industry and Commerce, Government of India. The Institute was shifted to Hyderabad in 1962 as a registered Society in the name of Small Industry Extension Training Institute (SIET).

With the enactment of MSMED Act, 2006, the Institute expanded focus of its objectives and re-designated its organization structure. In line with the new Act, the Institute was restructured as National Institute for Micro, Small and Medium enterprises (ni-msme).

4.5.1 Objective

ni-msme primarily functions as a Trainer of Master Trainers. With evolving technology and market dynamics, it has expanded its mandate to include consultancy, research, education, extension, and information services.

Aligned with national objectives of industrial and economic development, the Institute focuses on key areas such as: Innovation and Incubation, Entrepreneurship, Skill Development, Technology Upgradation and Transfer, Policy Support, NGO Networking, Environmental Sustainability, Cluster Development, Management Consultancy, Quality Services, Digital Marketing and Branding, Financial Services, and Information Services.

4.5.2 Functions

Enterprise promotion and entrepreneurship development being the central focus of ni-msme, the Institute's competencies converge on the following aspects:

- Training new corners in Information Technology
- Spotlighting of topical issues through conferences, seminars, etc.
- Greater attention to need based programmes
- Programme evaluation
- Diagnostic and development studies for policy formulation; and
- Empowering the under-privileged through micro enterprise creation.

4.5.3 Organisation

The Institute is governed by a Governing Council, with the Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of MSME as President and Chairman, and the Secretary, MoMSME as Vice-President, Vice-Chairman, and Chairman of the Executive Committee. Day-to-day operations are managed by the Director General.

Activities are implemented through four Schools of Excellence—Enterprise Development, Enterprise Management, Entrepreneurship and Extension, and Enterprise Information and Communications—each comprising theme-focused centres and cells. Academic Council coordinates and oversees academic programmes, setting benchmarks for assessment and evaluation while accommodating contextual variations.

4.5.4 Major Activities and Achievements

Since 1962, National Institute for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (ni-msme) has been at the forefront of training, research, and consultancy, fostering growth, innovation, and sustainability for MSME. Between April–December 2025, the Institute conducted 607 capacity-building programs covering 20,421 participants across sectors:

Key Highlights:

a) Visit of Hon'ble Minister for MSME to ni-msme:

The Hon'ble Union Minister of MSME, visited ni-msme on 27th May 2025 and inaugurated the renovated "Chikankari" Guest House (Block-C) in the campus, upgraded to accommodate national and international delegates.

During the visit, a State Level Vendor Development Programme (VDP) for SC/ST entrepreneurs was organized by NSIC, attended by 120 entrepreneurs and CPSE procurement leaders from BHEL, HPCL, HAL, among others. The Hon'ble Minister emphasized that vendor development is a strategic tool to unlock procurement opportunities for SC/ST entrepreneurs.



b) International Programs and Delegate Visits:

- i. India-Denmark Cooperation: Initiated with an April workshop on Geographical Indications and IP with Danish Patent and Trademark Office (DKPTO); in December, a Joint Working Group finalized SOPs to institutionalize IP facilitation across India.
- ii. Green Transition and EV Sector: In collaboration with *Mentor to Impact*, ni-msme hosted a 13-member Danish delegation for a 10-day technical immersion on EV skill development, including fault diagnostics, battery maintenance, and vehicle testing.

- iii. Hosted delegations from Michigan State University, Africa, and the Pacific Islands (Fiji, Samoa, Solomon Islands) with Food and Agriculture Organization, to share India’s models for technology transfer, IP commercialization, and agri-enterprise promotion.
- iv. **Sustainability and Climate Action:** Partnered with UNIDO and GEF in November for a National Stakeholders Consultation on energy-efficient industrial boilers, reinforcing ni-msme’s role in reducing MSME sector’s carbon footprint.



c) Pan-India RAMP Initiatives

Under the Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance (RAMP) scheme, ni-msme implemented nationwide capacity-building and skill development programs across Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Tamil Nadu, and Assam. The focus was on institutional strengthening, grassroots skilling, and IPR awareness, bridging central policy with state-level execution.

d) ATI Scheme: Skilling to Livelihood

ni-msme operationalized the Assistance to Training Institutions (ATI) Scheme through Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programs (ESDPs) in high-growth sectors like Cybersecurity, AI, and Digital Marketing. Key initiatives included:

- Job Mela (April 2025): 22 companies participated to hire trained youth.
- Loan Mela (July 2025): Facilitated access to credit for 170 participants via seven banks. Over 340 beneficiaries transitioned from trainees to entrepreneurs, creating a holistic skilling-to-livelihood ecosystem.

e) Strategic Alliances for Enterprise Growth

In 2025, ni-msme strengthened its role as a national implementation node by formalizing strategic MoUs with key state agencies, including Andhra Pradesh MSME Development Corporation (APMSMEDC), Meghalaya State Rural Livelihoods Mission (MSRLM), State Bank Academy (SBA) and Institute of Cost Accountants of India (ICMAI). These agreements launched SVEP operations and structured capacity-building initiatives, fostering sustainable rural livelihoods and integrating tribal communities into the economic mainstream. Through these partnerships, ni-msme effectively bridged central mandates with state-level implementation, tailoring enterprise development frameworks to regional needs.

f) Intellectual Property Facilitation

The Intellectual Property Facilitation Centre (IPFC) enabled grassroots innovation with 17 Design Registrations, 23 patent applications, and 52 trademarks in FY 2025-26 (till Dec 31), supporting the commercialization of local IP assets.

g) 5-Star FSSAI 'Eat Right Campus' Rating

ni-msme received the 'Eat Right Campus' certification from FSSAI on 6th August 2025, affirming its commitment to safe, healthy, and sustainable food options for staff, trainees, and delegates.



4.6 Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialisation (MGIRI)

4.6.1 Mahatma Gandhi initiated All India Village Industries Association (AIVIA) in 1934 at Maganwadi, Wardha Maharashtra to support rural industrialization through Science and Technology interventions. In 1955, Jamnalal Bajaj Central Research Institute (JBCRI) was established to continue AIVIA's activities under Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC). Between 2001 and 2008, JBCRI was revamped with support from IIT Delhi and KVIC, leading to the creation of Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialization (MGIRI). MGIRI was set up as a national institute under the Ministry of MSME, at Maganwadi, Wardha and began autonomous functioning from 2008.

4.6.2 Objective:

The main objectives of the institute as enunciated in its Memorandum of Association include:

- To accelerate rural industrialization for sustainable village economy so that KVI sector co-exists with the main stream
- Attract professionals and experts to Gram Swaraj
- Empower traditional artisans
- Innovation through pilot study/field trials
- Research and Development for alternative technology using local resources

4.6.3 Functions:

The activities of MGIRI are being carried out by its six divisions each headed by a Senior Scientist/Technologist.

- i. Rural Chemical Industries Division: The main focus of this division is to promote quality consciousness and consistency in the area of food processing, organic foods and other products of rural chemical industries. It also provides a comprehensive quality testing support and is working towards developing field worthy kits, techniques and technologies to facilitate the cottage and small-scale units in this area.

- ii. **Khadi and Textile Division:** The activities mainly carried out by this division are to improve the productivity, value addition and quality of products manufactured in khadi institutions by introducing new technologies and by providing quality assurance support. It also works towards facilitating eco-friendly products and methods
- iii. **Bio-processing and Herbal Division:** This division of MGIRI prepared technology package and simple quality assurance methods to facilitate production and utilization of organic manures, bio-fertilizers and bio-pesticides to promote rural entrepreneurs. This section is also making efforts to develop new formulations using 'Panchagavya' and their quality assurance procedures and facilities.
- iv. **Rural Energy and Infrastructure Division:** This division has been mandated to develop user-friendly and cost-effective technologies utilizing commonly available renewable resources of energy to facilitate rural industries and also to carry out audit of traditional rural industries so as to make them energy efficient.
- v. **Rural Crafts and Engineering Division:** This division has been mandated to develop user-friendly and cost-effective technologies utilizing commonly available renewable resources of energy to facilitate rural industries and also to carry out audit of traditional rural industries so as to make them energy efficient.
- vi. **Management and Systems Division:** This division provides information and communication technology based solutions for rural industries with a view to enhance their global competitiveness.

4.6.4 Organization:

MGIRI has a General Council (GC), President of the GC is the Hon'ble Union Minister of MSME, Govt. of India and an Executive Council (EC) lead by the Secretary of the Ministry of MSME, Govt. of India as the Chairman. The Director of the Institute is the Member Secretary of both GC and EC.

4.6.5 Major Initiatives

- i. MGIRI has developed 09 new products for Rural Industries Sector (viz., SLES/AOS free Toilet Cleaner, Lubricant (Grease) from Waste Plastic Fuel Industry, Innovative Garment Designs 04 Nos, Pectin Extraction Pilot Plant, Essential Oil Deep, Orange Peel Tea Pouch)
- ii. MGIRI has developed 07 new machines/processes for Rural Industries sector (Seabukthorn Harvesting Tool, Box type Charcoal Pyrolyzer, Biomass Based Sanitary Pad Incinerator, Electric Sigdi for Lacquerware Craft Sector, Solar Operated Workstation for Blacksmith, Portable Solar Operated Battery Charging Unit, Smart Remote Honey Bee Hive Monitoring System)
- iii. MGIRI has provided quality testing and guidance services to 61 agencies such as institutions, entrepreneurs, students, farmers etc. for different product/parameters samples to improve and maintain the quality of the products as per Indian standards and determination of nutrient contents in the products.
- iv. MGIRI organized 02 major National Workshops, 'Design and Development of Improved Hand Operated Charkha: A Way Forward' and 'National level Stakeholders Meet on Dissemination of MGIRI Technologies' in collaboration with institutes of national importance.

Major Schemes, Programs and Initiatives

Introduction

Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSME) serve as the backbone of economic development, contributing significantly to employment generation, industrial output, and exports. Recognizing their pivotal role, the government has introduced a range of initiatives to address the diverse needs of this sector. These initiatives span across critical areas, including **Credit and Financial Assistance, Skill Development Training, Infrastructure Development, Marketing Assistance, Technological and Quality Upgradation, and Other Services**. Together, these schemes aim to empower MSME by fostering innovation, improving competitiveness, and ensuring sustainable growth, thereby strengthening their contribution to the nation's economy. A detailed list of the Schemes of Ministry of MSME is given below.

5.1. Credit and Financial Assistance

Access to affordable and adequate credit is critical for the growth and sustainability of MSME. Recognizing this, the government has introduced several schemes aimed at providing financial support to MSME, enabling them to meet their operational and expansion needs. Below are the major schemes under this theme:

5.1.1. PM Vishwakarma Scheme

Launched in September, 2023, with an initial outlay of ₹ 13,000 crore, 'PM Vishwakarma' aims to enhance the quality and reach of artisans' products and services, integrating them into domestic and global value chains. The scheme provides holistic support to help artisans move up the value chain, improving their trades, socio-economic status, and quality of life.

Objective:

- To enable the recognition of artisans and craftspeople as Vishwakarma under 18 trades, making them eligible to avail all the benefits under the Scheme.
- To provide skill upgradation to hone their skills and make relevant and suitable training opportunities available to them.

- To provide support for better and modern tools to enhance their capability, productivity, and quality of products and services.
- To provide the beneficiaries an easy access to collateral free credit and reduce the cost of credit by providing interest subvention.
- To provide incentives for digital transactions to encourage digital empowerment of Vishwakarmas.
- To provide a platform for brand promotion and market linkages to help them access new opportunities for growth.

Key Highlights:

The Scheme provides of the following benefits to the artisans and crafts persons:

- **Recognition:** Recognition of artisans and craftspeople through PM Vishwakarma certificate and ID card.
- **Skill Upgradation:** Basic Training of 5-7 days and Advanced Training of 15 days or more, with a stipend of ₹ 500 per day;
- **Toolkit Incentive:** A toolkit incentive of upto ₹ 15,000 in the form of e-vouchers at the beginning of Basic Skill Training.
- **Credit Support:** Collateral free 'Enterprise Development Loans' of upto ₹ 3 lakh in two tranches of ₹ 1 lakh and ₹ 2 lakh with repayment tenures of 18 months and 30 months, respectively, at a concessional rate of interest fixed at 5%, with Government of India subvention to the extent of 8%. Beneficiaries who have completed Basic Training will be eligible to avail the first tranche of credit support of upto ₹ 1 lakh. The second loan tranche will be available to beneficiaries who have availed the 1st tranche and maintained a standard loan account and have adopted digital transactions in their business or have undergone Advanced Training.
- **Incentive for Digital Transaction:** An amount of Re. 1 per digital transaction, upto maximum 100 transactions monthly will be credited to the beneficiary's account for each digital pay-out or receipt.
- **Marketing Support:** Marketing support will be provided to the artisans and craftspeople in the form of quality certification, branding, onboarding on e-commerce platforms such as GeM, advertising, publicity and other marketing activities to improve linkage to value chain.
- The beneficiaries will be registered on Udyam Assist Platform as enterprises.

Achievements

- **Registrations:**
 - Against the target of 30 lakh registrations approved for a period of 5 years (FY

2023–24 to FY 2027–28), the Scheme has successfully achieved the target of 30 lakh beneficiaries within just 2 years of its implementation.

➤ **Skill Upgradation:**

- 23.19 lakh beneficiaries have completed basic skill training.

➤ **Toolkit e-Voucher:**

- e-Voucher for the toolkit have been issued to 23.19 lakh beneficiaries.

➤ **Collateral-free Concessional Loans:**

- ₹ 4578.40 crore sanctioned to 5.31 lakh beneficiaries in the form of collateral-free loans at concessional rate of interest.

➤ **Digital Incentive:**

- 8.85 lakh beneficiaries are digitally enabled.

➤ **Marketing support:**

Marketing support to the products of Vishwakarma through online platforms such as ONDC, GeM, FABIndia, Meesho and various exhibitions, displays, trade fairs etc. Progress under the various marketing activities conducted since inception till FY 2025-26 is as follows:

- Govt/Private agencies empaneled for marketing support: GeM, ONDC, NID, IRMA, Meesho, Amazon and FabIndia
- Number of applicants onboard GeM: 30,000 +
- Number of applicants Onboarded through ONDC on seller network participants: 1,700 with a cumulative total of 30 transactions completed
- Number of applicants Onboarded on FABIndia: 160, with 20 products cataloged from 9 Vishwakarmas
- Number of Trade fairs organised: 50
- Number of State-level PM Vishwakarma Exhibitions organized: 37
- Number of Vishwakarma received benefits from Trade fair and exhibition: 2,923
- Number of State-level PMUs established: 26
- Number of Vishwakarma trained on E-commerce by Meesho: 1,685 +
- Number of Vishwakarma onboarded on Meesho: 436+

5.1.2. Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP)

PMEGP is a central sector scheme being administered by Ministry of MSME which aims at generating self-employment opportunities through establishment of micro-enterprises in

non-farm sector for rural as well as urban areas. PMEGP is in operation since 2008-09 and has been approved for continuation over the 15th Finance Commission cycle i.e., for the period of five years from FY 2021-22 to FY 2025-26. The Scheme is being implemented by Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC), as the nodal agency at the National level. At the State level, the scheme is implemented through State offices of KVIC, State Khadi and Village Industries Boards (KVIBs), District Industries Centres (DICs), Coir Board (for coir related activities) and Banks.

Key Objectives:

- The scheme aims to generate employment opportunities in rural as well as urban areas of the country through setting up of new self-employment ventures/projects/micro enterprises.
- The scheme seeks to provide continuous and sustainable employment to all segments of traditional and prospective artisans and rural/urban unemployed youth in the country, thereby curbing the migration of youth from rural to urban areas.

Highlights:

- Margin Money (subsidy) for setting up new micro-enterprises would be provided at the rate of 25% of project cost for rural areas and 15% for urban areas in the case of General category and 35% for rural areas and 25% for urban areas for Special category.
- The maximum cost of the project/ unit admissible under manufacturing sector is Rs.50 lakh and under business/service sector is ₹20 Lakh.
- All new units setup under PMEGP will be mandatorily registered under Udyam Portal before Physical Verification of the Unit and the adjustment of the Margin Money in the PMEGP beneficiary loan account.
- Geo-tagging of the PMEGP units have been initiated for capturing the details of the products and services offered by the units and to create market linkages for them.
- PMEGP applications were being accepted from beneficiaries in physical form in 11 regional languages since January 2024 excluding Hindi and English. However, since June 2025, offline applications are being accepted in 19 regional languages i.e., Gujarati, Malayalam, Punjabi, Manipuri, Bangla, Marathi, Tamil, Assamese, Kannada, Oriya, Telugu, Bodo, Dogri, Kashmiri, Konkani, Nepali, Sindhi, Urdu, Maithili.

Intended Beneficiaries:

- Any individual, above 18 years of age is eligible under the scheme.
- Prospective entrepreneurs belonging to Aspirational Districts and Transgender Category have been included in the Special Category for higher subsidy.

2nd Loan For Up-Gradation of the Existing PMEGP / REGP / MUDRA Units

- Since 2018-19, existing PMEGP/REGP/MUDRA enterprises are also supported based on

past good performances with 2nd loan for upgradation and expansion. Maximum project cost admissible for Margin Money (MM) subsidy under Manufacturing sector is ₹ 1.00 crore and for Service sector is ₹ 25 Lakhs. Eligible subsidy on 2nd loan for all categories is 15% of project cost (20% for NER and Hill States).

Achievements:

- Since inception in FY 2008-09 till FY 2025-26 (as on 31.12.2025), a total of 10.73 lakh micro enterprises have been assisted with a Margin Money subsidy of ₹ 29,295 Crore and provided estimated employment opportunities to 87.37 Lakh persons.
- Approximately 80% of the units established under PMEGP are in rural areas, with the remaining 20% in urban regions.
- Over 50% of the units are owned by Women, Scheduled Castes (SCs), and Scheduled Tribes (STs).
- Around 15% units have been setup in Aspirational Districts.
- Performance of the Scheme during the years 2021-22, 2022-23, 2023-24, 2024-25 and current year is given below: -

5.1.3. Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance (RAMP) Scheme

RAMP is a World Bank supported Central Sector Scheme aimed at improving access of MSME to market, finance and technology upgradation by enhancing the outreach of existing MoMSME schemes. The programme also aims at strengthening institutions at the Central and State level, and enhancing Centre- State collaboration.

The total project cost of RAMP, for the five years FY 2022-23 to 2026-27 is ₹6062.45Cr, of which, World Bank support is ₹3750 Cr (USD 500 million and the rest is Govt of India funding.

Major Objectives:

- Accelerating Centre- State collaboration in MSME promotion and development
- Enhancing effectiveness of existing M/o MSME schemes by technology upgradation
- Strengthening Receivable Financing Market for MSME

- Enhancing effectiveness of Credit Guarantee Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises (CGTMSE), and promoting guarantee for greening initiatives of MSE, and women owned MSE
- Reducing incidence of delayed payments to MSE

Key Highlights:

- RAMP scheme would enhance the performance of MSME by promoting technology upgradation, innovation, digitization, market access, credit, etc through active participation of the Central and State Government Departments and Agencies.
- RAMP scheme envisages to benefit more than 5.5 lakh MSME during the programme period (FY 2022-23 to 2026-27). The programme implementation will be through the State agencies.
- Under the aegis of RAMP programme, the Ministry has launched four sub-schemes
 - MSE Green Investments and Financing for Transformation (MSE-GIFT): Provides interest subvention and guarantee for selected green technologies.
 - MSE Scheme for Promotion Investment in Circular Economy (MSE-SPICE): Provides capital subsidy to existing MSE for implementing Circular Economy solutions.
 - MSE-ODR (Online Dispute Resolution) for speedy and efficacious resolution of delayed payment cases through MSME ODR Portal with an outlay of ₹ 189 cr.
 - MSME TEAM scheme : Provide support for e-commerce enablement of MSME by conducting onboarding workshops, providing product cataloguing and handholding/ account management support.
- *National MSME Council*
 - A National MSME Council has been constituted under the Chairmanship of the Hon'ble Minister, MSME, with Secretaries of allied Central Ministries/ Departments, Principal Secretaries of States/UTs as Members.
 - The functions of the Council include overseeing inter Central Ministerial / Departmental coordination, Centre-State synergies and progress on the reforms mandated in MSME sector including RAMP.

Achievements:

- All 36 States/ UTs have evinced interest in participating in the Scheme by signing Letters of Undertaking (LoUs) with the Ministry of MSME. All 36 participating States/UTs were provided a grant of ₹ 5 crore each, for preparing a Strategic Investment Plan (SIP), which will be a roadmap for development and promotion of MSME sector in the respective State/ UT.
- The Ministry has evaluated SIPs received from all 36 States / UTs and gap funding for over 400 selected projects amounting to Rs 3031.77 cr have been approved. The States / UTs are in the process of implementing the approved projects. The Ministry is closely reviewing the progress of implementation.
- Progress on RAMP sub-Scheme(GIFT/SPICE/TEAMS)
 - **MSE GIFT:** Against a target of 5,400, 4,803 MSE loans have been sanctioned for adoption of green technologies, with a cumulative sanctioned amount exceeding **₹3,272 crore**.
 - **MSE SPICE:** A technology deck comprising **116 Circular Economy (CE) technologies** has been approved. To date, 10 MSE have received capital subsidy support for adoption of CE solutions.
 - **TEAM Initiative Portal:** The portal for registration of MSE and Seller Network Participants (SNPs) is operational. To date, **32 SNPs** have been empanelled, **4,500 MSE** registered—of which **1,700 are women-owned—and 2,500 MSE** have been successfully onboarded.
 - **MSME ODR Portal:** MSME ODR portal was launched on **MSME Day 2025** and is fully operational, with **new cases being filed and resolved** through the platform. Since the inauguration of the ODR Portal, a total of 17 cases have been disposed of in 8 months, out of which 15 cases were resolved at the Pre-MSEFC stage(friendly resolution stage) and 2 cases at the Conciliation stage. The aggregate amount settled across these cases stands at ₹60.60 lakh.



5.1.4. Credit Guarantee Fund Trust For MSE (CGTMSE) –

Ministry of MSME implements Credit Guarantee Scheme (CGS) for Micro and Small Enterprises through Credit Guarantee Fund Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises (CGTMSE). Under the Scheme, credit guarantee is provided for extending collateral free and third-party guarantee free loans to Micro and Small Enterprises (MSE) through Member Lending Institutions.

Key highlights:

- The ceiling for guarantee coverage is ₹ 10 crore (w.e.f. 01.04.2025) per borrower.
- A nominal amount towards an Annual Guarantee Fee (AGF) for the credit facility sanctioned is charged on the outstanding loan amount.
- The extent of guarantee ranges from 75% to 90% depending upon the quantum of loan and type of beneficiary.
- Concession in guarantee fee by 10% in respect of loans given to special categories of the borrowers (SC/ST owned MSE, MSE owned by Women, MSE owned by Person with Disability, MSE owned by Agniveers, MSE owned by Transgenders, ZED certified MSE, MSE situated in Aspirational Districts and MSE located in North East Region (including Sikkim), UT of Jammu and Kashmir and UT of Ladakh).
- Recognizing the importance of women entrepreneurs, the guarantee coverage for women-led enterprises has been enhanced to 90% to promote their participation in the economic growth of the country.

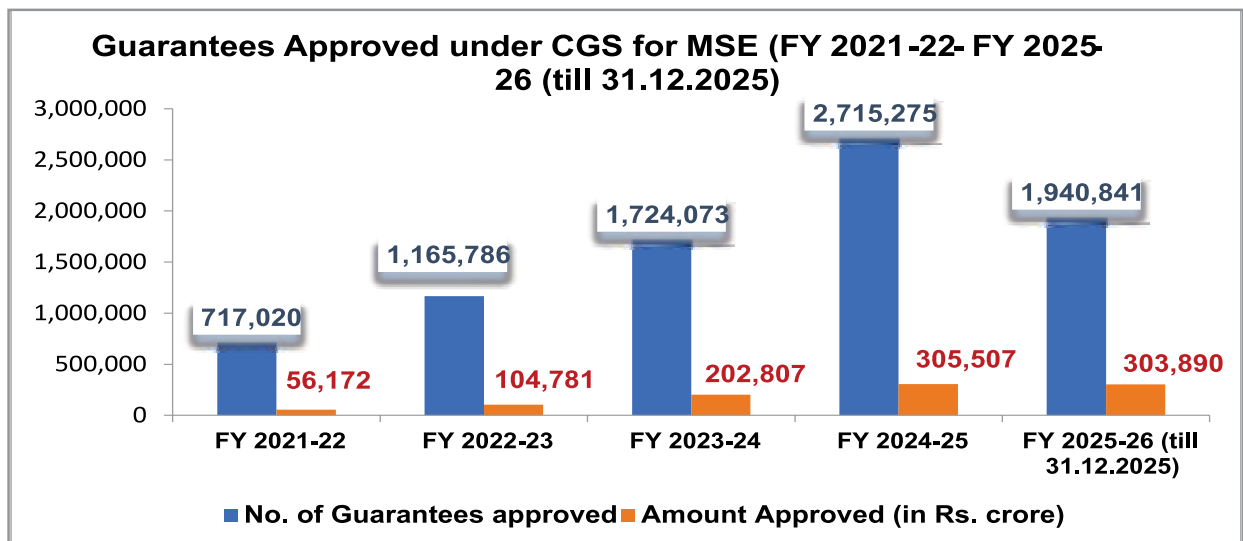
Achievements:

- Since its inception in FY 2001 till 31.12.2025, a total of 1.35 crore credit guarantees amounting to ₹ 12.39 lakh crore have been extended to MSE.
 - o 29.67 lakh guarantees amounting to ₹ 1.93 lakh crore have been extended to MSE owned by Women Entrepreneurs.
 - o 6.53 lakh guarantees amounting to ₹ 22,525 crore have been extended to MSE owned by SC Entrepreneurs.
 - o 2.23 lakh guarantees amounting to ₹ 10,713 crore have been extended to MSE owned by ST Entrepreneurs.
 - o 23.72 lakh guarantees amounting to ₹ 1.21 lakh crore have been extended to MSE owned by OBC Entrepreneurs.
 - o 40,987 guarantees amounting to ₹ 3,053 crore have been extended to MSE owned by Person with Disability.

- Since its inception, the CGTMSE Scheme has benefited over 1 crore enterprises, with 1.01 crore proposals approved for guarantee cover totaling ₹8.07 lakh crore as of December 31, 2024.
- Beneficiaries of the scheme have experienced notable improvements in their turnover and employment generation following CGTMSE funding. This has led to a positive impact in several key areas of the MSE sector, including technology upgradation, skill development, market expansion, and both economic and social development.
- The scheme has seen significant geographical expansion, with a strong emphasis on reaching underserved regions, particularly the North-East, ensuring inclusive growth across the country.
- More than 100 industrial sectors have benefited from the scheme, highlighting its broad applicability across various segments of the MSE sector.
- The impact is not confined to major industrial hubs alone; the scheme has also extended its benefits to tier-2 and tier-3 towns, promoting regional growth and decentralizing industrial development.
- CGTMSE has proven to be highly effective in settling claims.

5.2. Skill Development and Training

5.2.1. A Scheme for Promotion of Innovation, Rural Industry and Entrepreneurship (ASPIRE)

ASPIRE scheme was approved for continuation from 2021-22 to 2025-26 with a budget outlay of ₹194.87 cr. The guidelines were issued on 28.01.2022 with the following objectives and interventions.

Objectives:

- Create jobs and reduce employment,
- Promote entrepreneurship culture in India,
- Promote innovation to strengthen the competitiveness of MSME sector.

Component under the scheme:

- (i) Livelihood Business Incubator (LBI):** An entity setup for imparting skill development and incubation programs for promoting entrepreneurship and employment generation in agro-rural sector with special focus on rural and underserved areas.

Eligibility for proposals under the Scheme:

- Any agency/institution of Government of India/ State government or existing training centres under Ministries/Departments of Government of India/State Government, Industry Associations, Academic Institutions - Assistance of upto ₹100 Lakhs to eligible agencies for procurement of plant and machinery only and upto ₹100 Lakhs as operational expenditure support.
- Any not-for-profit private institutions with experience in successfully executing incubation and/or skill development programs may be eligible to set up an LBI - Assistance of upto ₹75 Lakhs to eligible agencies for procurement of plant and machinery only and upto ₹100 Lakhs as operational expenditure support.

Achievements:

As on 31.12.2025, 109 Livelihood Business Incubators (LBIs) and 22 Technology Business Incubators (TBIs) have been approved.

- 82 LBIs and 14 TBIs are already functional. A total of 1,16,801 beneficiaries have been trained in the 82 functional LBIs, of which 18,044 trainees were self-employed and 13,843 trainees were employed in agro rural sector.
- Additionally, 1,150 micro enterprises have been supported/established till date.
- 11 AIFs have been committed ₹ 217.5 crore out of the corpus ₹ 310 cr under ASPIRE FoF.

- (ii) ASPIRE Fund of Funds (FoF) managed by SIDBI:** Established with a focus to invest through Alternate Investment Funds (AIFs), in early-stage start-ups that require support and nurturing to succeed in developing technology and business enterprise in the areas of innovation, entrepreneurship, developing forward and backward linkages with multiple value chain of manufacturing and service delivery in the agro-based sector. The total corpus of SIDBI FoF is Rs 310 cr.

5.2.2. Entrepreneurship and Skill Development Programmes (ESDP)

The objective of the programme is to motivate youth representing different sections of the society including SC/ST, Women, differently abled, Ex-servicemen and BPL persons to consider self employment or entrepreneurship as one of the career options. The ultimate

objective is to promote new enterprises, build capacity of existing MSME and inculcate entrepreneurial culture in the country.

The scheme (ESDP) is implemented across the length and breadth of the country. As per the ESDP guidelines, approved on 25.3.2022, ESDP Scheme has five components viz.

- **Entrepreneurship Awareness Programme (EAP)** - Duration- One Day, 50-100 participants, costing ₹ 20,000/- per programme.
- **Entrepreneurship cum Skill Development Programme (E-SDP)**- Minimum 6 Weeks Programme, 25 participants, Cost- ₹ 1,25,000/- per programme.
- **Advance E-SDP**- This component is newly added, which costs ₹ 10.00 Lakhs (max.) per programmes to be conducted by premier Institutes like IIT, IIM, ICAR, BARC, Agricultural Universities of State or Central Governments.
- **Management Development Programme (MDP)** – Minimum One Week, 20-25 participants, cost-₹ 50,000/- per programme.
- **Advance MDP**- Newly added in the guidelines approved for the 15th FC which costs ₹ 10.00 lakhs per programme to be conducted by premier institutes like State Administrative Training Institutes (ATIs) and/or other reputed institutions of Central/State Governments/ NIT / Regional Engineering Colleges / Agricultural Colleges / Autonomous Bodies of Central / State Governments.

5.2.3. Assistance to Training Institution (ATI) scheme

Assistance is provided to training institutions under the Ministry viz., ni-msme, KVIC, Coir Board, Tool Rooms, NSIC and MGIRI in the form of capital grant for the purpose of creation and strengthening of infrastructure and support for entrepreneurship development and skill development training programmes. Assistance is also provided to existing State level EDIs and State Government owned training Institutes including Districts Industries Centers (DICs) located in Eastern Region and NER, for creation or strengthening/expansion of their training infrastructure (max 3.00 Cr in each case). A total number of 2,82,023 trainees have been trained and around 61 institutes/organizations have been supported with total expenditure of ₹ 417.46 crore, from FY 2014-15 to FY 2025-26 (as on 31.12.2025) under ATI scheme.

5.3. Infrastructure Development

5.3.1. Micro and Small enterprises Cluster Development Programme (MSE-CDP)

Ministry of MSME is implementing Micro and Small Enterprises - Cluster Development Programme (MSE-CDP) for development of clusters. MSE-CDP is a demand driven Central Sector Scheme wherein, State Governments send proposals as per common needs of existing cluster in their States/UTs.

Objective:

- To enhance the productivity and competitiveness of Micro and Small Enterprises (MSE) by extending financial assistance as Government of India (GoI) grant for establishment of Common Facility Centers (CFCs) in the existing clusters.
- For establishment of new / upgradation of existing Industrial Areas / Estates / Flatted Factory Complex.

Key Components of the Scheme:

a. Common Facility Centers (CFCs):

- The GoI grant will be restricted to 70% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 10.00 crore) and 60% of project cost (₹ 10.00 crore - 30.00 crore).
- In case of NER and Hill States, Island territories, Aspirational Districts, LWE affected districts and clusters with more than 50% micro/village or women owned or SC/ST owned units, GoI grant will be 80% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 10.00 crore) and 70% of project cost (₹ 10.00 crore - 30.00 crore).
- CFC projects with cost more than ₹ 30.00 crore are also considered however, the GoI assistance would be on maximum eligible project cost of ₹30.00 crore.

b. Infrastructure Development:

- The GoI grant will be restricted to 60% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 15.00 crore) for setting up of new Industrial Estate / Flatted Factory Complex and GoI grant will be 50% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 10.00 crore) for up-gradation of existing Industrial Estate / Flatted Factory Complex.
- In case of NE and Hill States, Island territories, Aspirational Districts, LWE affected districts and clusters with more than 50% micro/village or women owned or SC/ST owned units, GoI grant will be 70% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 15.00 crore) for setting up of new Industrial Estate / Flatted Factory Complex and 60% of project cost (₹ 5.00 crore - 10.00 crore) for up-gradation of existing Industrial Estate / Flatted Factory Complex.
- The ID project with cost more than ₹ 10.00 crore/15.00 crore are also considered however the GoI assistance would be on maximum eligible project cost of ₹ 10.00 crore/15.00 crore.

Achievements:

- Since inception of the scheme, out of the total 606 approved projects, 242 projects are ongoing and 364 projects have been completed.
- During the year, 20 projects were approved with a total project cost of ₹441.71 crore, and a total Government of India assistance of ₹273.29 crore.

5.4. Marketing Assistance

5.4.1. Procurement and Marketing Support (PMS) Scheme

The Procurement and Marketing Scheme has been introduced to enhance the marketability of products and services in MSME Sector. The Scheme provides market access initiatives like organizing/participation in National/International Trade Fairs/Exhibitions/MSME Expo/ National Workshop / Seminar, etc. held across the country. Further, Vendor Development Programs are conducted to facilitate market linkages for effective implementation of Public Procurement Policy for Micro and Small Enterprises (MSE). Following are the new initiatives under the Scheme:

- Adoption of Bar Code by Micro Enterprises.
- Adoption of e-Commerce by Micro Enterprises.
- Adoption of Modern Packaging Techniques.

5.5. Technology Upgradation and Competitiveness

5.5.1. MSME Champions Scheme

MSME Champions scheme is a holistic approach to unify, synergize, and converge various schemes and interventions with a single purpose. The Scheme has been formulated through Standing Finance Committee (SFC)) for a period of 5 years i.e., 2021-22 to 2025-26. There are 3 components under MSME Champions scheme, the details of which are as below:

- A. MSME Sustainable (ZED) Certification Scheme
- B. MSME-Competitive (Lean) Scheme
- C. MSME-Innovative (for Incubation, IPR, Design and Digital MSME) Scheme

Objective:

- To select clusters and enterprises and modernize their processes, reduce wastages, sharpen business competitiveness, and facilitate their National and Global reach and excellence.

i. MSME Sustainable (ZED) Certification Scheme:

Launched in April, 2022, MSME Sustainable (ZED) Certification is a transformative initiative aimed at promoting Zero Defect Zero Effect (ZED) practices among MSME.

Key Highlights:

- **Awareness:** Promotes Zero Defect Zero Effect (ZED) practices among MSME.
- **Encouragement for MSME:** Inspire MSME to become MSME Champions through the ZED Certification journey.
- **Benefits of ZED Certification:** Substantial reduction in wastage, increased productivity and operational efficiency, enhanced environmental consciousness and energy conservation, optimal utilization of natural resources and expansion of market opportunities.
- **Adoption of Best Practices:** Motivate MSME to standardize products, processes, and system.
- **Global Competitiveness:** Focuses on improving competitiveness through assessment, handholding, managerial and technological interventions.
- **Sustainability:** Encourages sustainable practices for long-term growth and environmental stewardship.

Nature of Assistance:

- Cost of Certification : Level 1: BRONZE: ₹ 8,000/-, Level 2: SILVER: ₹ 32,000/- and Level 3: GOLD: ₹ 72,000/-
- Subsidy on ZED Certification cost: Joining reward of ₹ 10,000/- (effectively making bronze certification free if availed). Subsidy rate as 80% for micro enterprises, 60% for small enterprises, 50% for medium enterprises and 100% subsidy for women-owned MSME
- Additional subsidy: 10% Additional subsidy for MSME owned by SC/ST entrepreneurs and enterprises located in NER / Himalayan / LWE / Island territories/Aspirational districts
5% for MSME which are also a part of SFURTI (Scheme of Fund for Regeneration of Traditional Industries) and MSE-CDP (Micro and Small Enterprises Cluster Development Programme)
- Financial Assistance in Testing/Quality/Product Certification: Up to 75% of the total cost against multiple Testing/System/Product Certification, with the maximum subsidy of ₹ 50,000/-
- Handholding/Consultancy Support: Financial assistance of up to ₹2 lakh for handholding and consultancy to help MSME achieve higher certification levels.
- Support in Technology Upgradation for Zero Effect Solutions: Financial support of up to ₹3 lakh for adopting zero-effect solutions, pollution control measures, and cleaner technologies.

Achievements:

- Since its inception, a total of 7,23,377 MSME have registered under the Scheme, of which 2,81,391 MSME have registered in FY 2025-26 (as on 31st Dec 25)
- 2,02,273 Bronze, 2,089 Silver, and 1,461 Gold certifications have been awarded in FY 2025-26 (as on 31st Dec 25) to MSME.
- 22 States/UTs have included ZED in their respective Industrial Policies and offering additional incentives to ZED certified MSME
- 19 Financial Institutions initiated and notified incentives to ZED certified MSME in form of concessions in processing fee and rate of interest.
- Certification cost for Women-owned MSME has been effectively made zero.

ii. MSME-Competitive (Lean)

Launched in March, 2023, MSME Competitive (Lean) Scheme is an initiative by the Ministry of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises to enhance the competitiveness of MSME through the implementation of Lean Tools and Techniques. These methodologies, which are well-established and effective, focus on improving efficiency and optimizing processes to boost the competitiveness of MSME sectors.

The intended beneficiaries of the scheme are Udyam-registered Manufacturing MSME. The scheme is being implemented by the offices of the Development Commissioner (MSME), Ministry of MSME through Quality Council of India and National Productivity Council.

iii. **MSME-Innovative (for Incubation, IPR, Design and Digital MSME) Scheme**

MSME Innovative is an initiative for MSME designed to integrate innovation in incubation, design intervention and IPR protection in a single mode approach.

Objective:

It aims to raise awareness among MSME about India's innovation potential and inspire them to become MSME Champions. Serving as a hub for innovation, the initiative facilitates and guides the transformation of ideas into viable business propositions. The scheme has 3 sub-components as described below.

a. MSME-Innovative (Incubation)

The scheme aims to promote untapped creativity and encourage the adoption of advanced technologies in manufacturing and knowledge-based MSME. The intended beneficiaries of the scheme are Udyam-registered MSME and other entities. The scheme is being implemented through the offices of the Development Commissioner (MSME) under the Ministry of MSME. As of 5th Dec 25, an expenditure of ₹28.15 crore has been incurred under the Scheme.

Nature of Assistance:

Financial assistance of up to ₹ 15 lakh per idea is provided to Host Institutes (HIs) for developing and nurturing innovative ideas.

Achievement/Status:

- Host Institutes (HIs) approved: Total of 773 HIs across India.
- Idea submissions: 52,369 ideas received under Idea Hackathon 5.0, launched by the Hon'ble Minister of MSME on 27th June, 2025. HIs have forwarded 13,106 ideas. After documents scrutiny, 11088 ideas have been forwarded to Domain Experts Selection Committee (DESC) for further evaluation.

b. MSME-Innovative (Design)

The objective of this component is to create a common platform for collaboration between Manufacturing sector and Design expertise/ Design fraternity. It aims to provide expert advice and cost-effective solutions for addressing real-time design challenges, supporting new product development, its continuous improvement, and value addition to existing or new products.

The intended beneficiaries of the scheme are Udyam-registered Manufacturing MSME. The scheme is being implemented through the offices of the Development Commissioner (MSME) under the Ministry of MSME. As on 5th Dec 25, an expenditure of ₹20.54 crore has been incurred under the Scheme.

Nature of Assistance:

- Design Project: 75% of the total project cost will be contributed by GoI up to a maximum of ₹ 40 lakh.
- Student Project: 75% of the total project cost will be contributed by GoI up to a maximum of ₹ 2.5 lakh

Achievement/Status:

- MoUs have been signed with 12 NITs, 7 IITs and 1 IISC
- No. of cumulative Professional Design / Student Projects approved since launch: 69

c. MSME-Innovative (IPR)

The objective of the scheme is to strengthen the Intellectual Property (IP) culture in India by focusing on two key interventions:

- To raise awareness about Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs) among MSME, fostering creativity and innovation in the Indian economy.
- To implement measures that protect the ideas, technological innovations, and business strategies developed by MSME, enabling their commercialization and effective use of IPR tools.

The intended beneficiaries of the scheme are any applicant/entity/unit with a valid Udyam Registration. The scheme is being implemented through the offices of the Development Commissioner (MSME) under the Ministry of MSME. As on 5th Dec 25, an expenditure of ₹8.91 crore has been incurred under the Scheme.

5.5.2. National Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe Hub (NSSH)

National Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe Hub (NSSH) was launched by Hon'ble Prime Minister in October 2016 which is aimed at promoting entrepreneurship among the SC/ST and to fulfil the 4% procurement mandate by the CPSEs as laid down in the Central Government Public Procurement Policy and to boost entrepreneurship among SC/STs. The Hub has undertaken several initiatives to facilitate entrepreneurship among SC/ST MSE and to cater the challenge of credit, market linkages, finance facilitation, bid participation, etc.

The Scheme is being implemented through National Small Industries Corporation (NSIC), a PSU under this Ministry. Further, to provide mentoring and handholding support to SC/ST entrepreneurs across their business lifecycle and tender related participation with CPSEs, 15 National SC-ST Hub Offices (NSSHOs) have been set up across the country at Ludhiana, Agra, Lucknow, Mumbai, Pune, Sindhudurg, Ranchi, Chennai, Bengaluru, Bhubaneswar, Guwahati, Kolkata, Surat, Hyderabad, and Bodh Gaya.

Under the Special Credit Linked Capital Subsidy Scheme (SCLCSS) component, SC/ST MSE of manufacturing as well as service sectors are eligible for 25% subsidy (upto ₹ 25 lakh) for procurement of Plant and Machinery and equipment through institutional credit. Further, various skill and entrepreneurship development training programs are being provided to SC-ST entrepreneurs across the country through different training institutions. These training programs may bridge the existing skill gap, increase the technical as well as managerial capabilities of the entrepreneurs and develop entrepreneurship among target beneficiaries.

More than 1.59 lakh SC-ST entrepreneurs facilitated across the country since its inception under various activities of the scheme. The scheme has made a positive impact among target beneficiaries by way of professional support in upgrading their skills, facilitating market linkages and handholding support which is evident from 37-fold increase (in terms of value) in public procurement from SC/ST owned MSE i.e., ₹99.37 crore (0.07%) in 2015-16 to ₹ 3,731.50 Cr. (1.73%) in 2024-25. In FY 2025-26 (as on 14.01.2026), the share of SC/ST MSE in public procurement is 1.90%.

5.6. Digital Governance Initiatives

5.6.1. Inclusive Digital Governance and Multilingual Access

Ministry of MSME is advancing technology-driven digital governance to deliver equitable, transparent, and efficient services to MSME ecosystem in alignment with “Minimum Government, Maximum Governance”. These efforts address linguistic, geographic, and infrastructural barriers, enabling a citizen-centric, secure, and data-led transformation in service delivery, policy dissemination, and grievance redressal mechanisms.

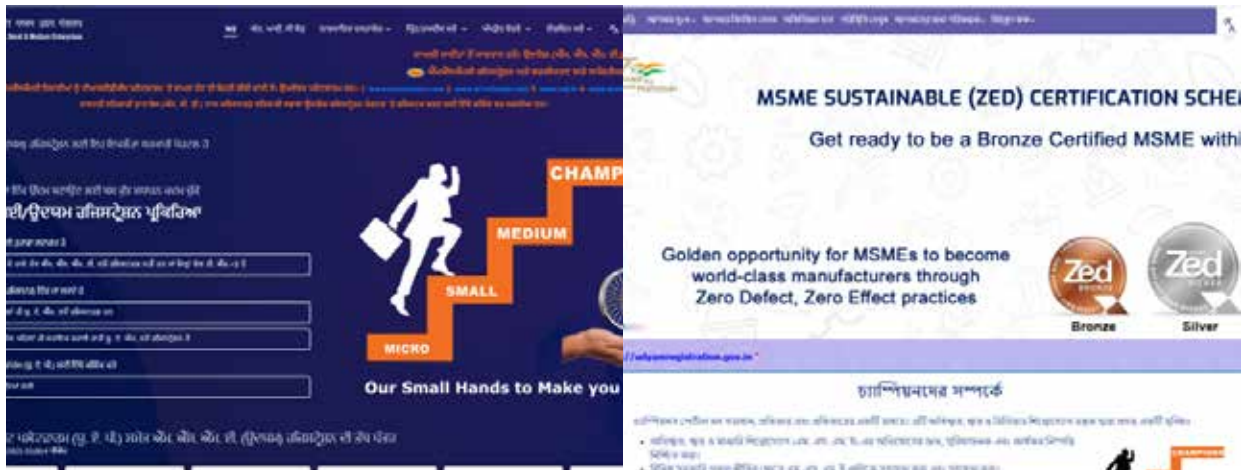
A major initiative under this framework is integration of the web applications of Ministry of MSME with the Digital India Bhashini Programme (MeitY), enabling multilingual access to information in 22 Scheduled Indian languages through real-time translation supported by domain-specific glossaries.

This functionality has been implemented across major MSME digital platforms, including Ministry of MSME Website, Office of DC MSME Portal, Udyam Registration Portal, Champions Portal, and the Zero Defect Zero Effect (ZED) Portal, significantly enhancing accessibility, inclusivity, and user experience for entrepreneurs nationwide.

5.6.2. Data-Driven Monitoring, Planning and Digital Infrastructure Management

To strengthen transparency, monitoring, and planning, the Ministry has deployed integrated digital systems that support data-driven governance and infrastructure oversight. The Performance Smartboard serves as a centralized Key Performance Indicators (KPI) dashboard, covering thematic areas, such as, Market Support, Credit and Finance Facilitation, Technology Infrastructure and Enablement, Entrepreneurship Development, Grievance Redressal Mechanisms, Major Schemes, and Udyam Portal insights, using API-based data integration and thematic clustering to promote transparency and evidence-based review.

In alignment with the PM GatiShakti National Master Plan (PMGS-NMP), the Ministry has completed geo-mapping of nearly one lakh MSME assets across 8 GIS thematic layers and 44 sub-layers, including ZED-certified MSME and 93,823 PMEGP beneficiaries, supported by three-tier validation, live dashboards, and periodic updates.

The internal IT Inventory Management Portal, provides centralized oversight of MSME web applications, incorporating a centralized application registry, hosting visibility, security audit tracking, SSL certificate monitoring with renewal alerts, real-time server and resource monitoring through APM tools, system health analysis, automated risk alerts, and data integration tracking, collectively enhancing governance, compliance, reliability, and cybersecurity of digital services. In addition, the IT and Planning Division of the Ministry regularly monitors and reviews e-Office and VPN accounts and undertakes necessary actions for deletion or transfer to prevent unauthorized or unnecessary usage.

5.6.3. Cyber Security Strengthening and Compliance

The Ministry has strengthened cyber security through awareness, monitoring, and clear guidelines for MSME. During National Cyber Security Awareness Month 2025 (“Cyber Jagrit Bharat”), an awareness session was conducted in collaboration with CERT-In on the 15 key cybersecurity elements.

Another knowledge session was conducted under the Chairmanship of Secretary, MSME on “Building Cyber Resilience Towards a Cyber Jagrit Bharat” in hybrid mode, as part of the National Cyber Security Awareness Month. The knowledge session covered various aspects relating to emerging digital threats, financial frauds and redressal mechanisms. Over 1,500 stakeholders participated in the hybrid session comprising officials of the Ministry, its

organisations, field offices, MSME Associations, and MSME. The key guest speakers included senior officials from the Intelligence Fusion and Strategic Operations (IFSO) Special Cell, Delhi Police, HDFC Bank, and Punjab National Bank.

A phishing simulation exercise with NIC, alongside sustained awareness messages through email, banners, kiosks, and digital channels. In 2025, thirty cyber incidents were reported to CERT-In with an average response time of 4.2 hours, and forty-one malware threats were quarantined through endpoint detection and response systems.

The Ministry is implementing CERT-In's 15 Elemental Cyber Defence Controls to improve asset management, system configuration, access control, and incident response.

A Cyber Security Citizen's Charter has been prepared and posted on the Ministry's website to enable MSME to stay cybersafe in simple, easy-to-follow language.

Targeted activities for the North-Eastern Region, Women, Specially Aabled Persons, and International Cooperation

6.1. Activities for the North-East Region (NER)

6.1.1 In line with the Government's initiative to earmark 10% of the Ministry's annual budget for the welfare and development of the North-Eastern Region (NER), an allocation of ₹ 1,186 crore was made in the Budget Estimate (BE) 2025-26 specifically for the region. This allocation supports and promotes the schemes and programmes of Ministry of MSME in the region and covers the States of Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Sikkim, and Tripura.

6.1.2. "Promotion of MSME in N.E. Region and Sikkim" Scheme

Introduction: The scheme was launched in the year 2016. It was further continued for implementation during 15th Finance Commission (2021-2026) with budget outlay of ₹295.00 Cr.

The scheme provides financial support to create or upgrade infrastructure and common facilities for MSME in the NER to supplement manufacturing, testing, packaging, product and process innovations and skilling activities.

Scheme Components:

1. Setting up of new and modernization of existing Mini Technology Centres:

Objective: The Scheme envisages financial assistance to State Governments for setting up of new and modernization of existing Tool Room/ Mini Technology Centers. Projects for creation of common facilities to supplement manufacturing, testing, packaging, Research and Development, product and process innovations and training for natural resources such as fruits, spices, agri, forestry, sericulture and bamboo etc. available in NER and Sikkim are given priority. The Geo tagging of the project is mandatory.

Financial Assistance: The maximum assistance from Government of India will be limited to ₹13.50 Cr. or 90% of the project cost, whichever is less. Balance and any excess amount to be contributed by State Government. The GoI assistance towards the building cost for up-gradation of infrastructure would be limited to ₹1.00 Cr. within the total permissible GoI assistance. Government of India financial assistance would not be admissible towards the cost of land.

2. Development of new and existing Industrial Estates:

Objective: Government of India financial assistance will be provided for development of new and existing Industrial Estates, Flatted Factory Complexes. The infrastructure facilities will include power distribution system, water, telecommunication, drainage and pollution control facilities, roads, storage and marketing outlets etc. Geo tagging of the project is mandatory.

Financial Assistance: The maximum assistance from Government of India will be limited to ₹13.50 Cr. for development of New Industrial Estate or ₹ 9.00 Cr. for development of Existing Industrial Estate or 90% of the project cost, whichever, is less. Balance and any excess amount to be contributed by State Government.

3. Development of Tourism Sector:

Objective: Looking into immense scope of tourism sector in NER and Sikkim, projects for creation of common services such as kitchen, bakery, laundry and dry cleaning, refrigeration and cold storage, IT infra, potable water, display centre for local products, centre for cultural activities etc. in a cluster of home stays may be considered. There has to be linkages of projects with local MSE. Projects of State Tourism Development Agencies or Central/State Autonomous bodies for Tourism Development shall be allowed.

The following will be the mandatory requirements-

- a. Geo tagging of the project;
- b. The validation of DPR by Ministry of Tourism;
- c. No. of minimum beneficiaries- 10 MSE (in tourism services);
- d. Beneficiaries should essentially be linked to any renowned e-commerce platform.

Financial Assistance: The assistance from Government of India will be limited to ₹ 4.50 Cr. or 90% of the project cost, whichever is less. Balance and any excess amount to be contributed by State Government.

Intended beneficiaries- All MSME in North Eastern Region

Physical and Financial Achievements: Since inception of the scheme in 2016, 73 projects have been approved and an expenditure of ₹ 319.34 Crore has been incurred under the scheme (as on 31.12.2025)

6.1.3. KVIC Activities for the North-East Region

6.1.3.1 In order to ensure effective implementation and monitoring of Khadi and Village Industries (KVI) programmes in the North Eastern Region (NER), Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) have a Zonal Office at Guwahati and other field Offices in NE States. KVI programmes are being implemented in the region through State KVI Boards, registered Institutions, Co-operative Societies and Entrepreneurs.

KVIC along with Khadi Institutions (KIs) from NER participated in the event named “Celebrating North East India Festival” held at Seoul, South Korea from 6th to 8th November, 2025, organized by NEIFT, Guwahati for the purpose of promoting the brand “Khadi India” at the global level.

6.1.3.2 Village Industries which are being setup in these hilly and backward areas include Fruit and Vegetable Processing Industries Beekeeping, Processing of Cereals and Pulses, Pottery, Fibre, Soap, Cane and Bamboo, Carpentry and Black smithy; and also Khadi Polyvastra activities.

- (i) A total number of 7,840 PMEGP projects have been assisted by utilizing Margin Money Subsidy of ₹ 231.41 Cr. in NER States during the year 2024-25. A total number of 3116 PMEGP projects have been assisted by utilizing Margin Money Subsidy of ₹ 90.15 Cr. in NER States during the year 2025-26 (up to 31.12.2025). 6.1.4. NSIC Activities in NER

6.1.4.1. MSME Marketing Conclave in Guwahati

The conclave focused on the TEAM initiative, which aims to digitally onboard 5 lakh micro and small enterprises, particularly women entrepreneurs, over the next two years to drive digital transformation.

6.2. Activities targeted at welfare of women

6.2.1. Under the Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP), women beneficiaries are entitled to a higher subsidy and lower own contribution. Since its inception (i.e., 2008-09 to 31st December 2025), a total of 3,57,658 projects of women entrepreneurs have been assisted under PMEGP.

The cumulative data on the number of women beneficiaries for the last five years (2021-22 to 2025-26) and the current year up to 31st December 2025 is as follows:

6.2.2 The primary focus of the schemes and programmes undertaken by the organizations of the Ministry is to provide and facilitate a broad range of services essential for accelerating

the development of MSME. However, there are certain schemes and programmes that are specifically oriented towards individual beneficiaries. Additionally, several schemes offer extra benefits, concessions, and assistance for women. Detailed information on these concessions can be found in the respective scheme guidelines available on the Ministry's website at www.msme.gov.in.

6.3. Welfare for Specially Abled Persons

6.3.1 The Ministry maintains a 'reservation roster' in accordance with the government's guidelines to ensure representation of specially abled persons. Vacancies arising from the 100-point roster for disabled individuals within the Ministry and its attached offices of DC (MSME), are regularly communicated to the Department of Personnel and Training for filling these posts. Additionally, various facilities, such as conveyance allowances, are provided to disabled employees working in different offices of the Ministry, in line with the Government of India's instructions.

6.3.2 Ministry of MSME's organizations, such as NSIC and ni-msme, are providing necessary reservation and preference for training in various fields of entrepreneurship development and related training modules. These initiatives are aimed at supporting the growth and empowerment of specially-abled individuals.

6.3.3 **PMEGP** – Under the Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP), differently-abled persons are categorized as Special Category beneficiaries, entitled to a higher rate of subsidy and a lower own contribution. Since its inception (i.e., 2008-09 to 31st December 2025), a total of 6,005 projects have been assisted for differently-abled persons under PMEGP.

6.4. International Cooperation

6.4.1. International Cooperation Scheme

- International Cooperation (IC) Scheme is a Central Sector Scheme which aims to build capacity of MSME for entering export market by facilitating their participation in international exhibitions and fairs abroad.
- Under the IC scheme, financial assistance is provided on reimbursement basis to the eligible

Central/State Government organizations/Industry Associations to facilitate participation of MSME in the international exhibitions held abroad, organizing international conference in India as well as reimbursement of various costs involved in export of goods and services with the aim of technology upgradation, modernization, joint venture etc.

- Under the Market Development Assistance component of the Scheme, a total of 293 MSME have been facilitated by way of participation in 22 International Fairs/Exhibitions during the year 2025. Further, 5,252 MSME have benefitted directly by participating in 18 International conferences organised in India.
- Under the Capacity Building of First Time Exporters (CBFTE) component of the Scheme, during the year 2025, a total of 19 Micro and Small Enterprises have been assisted by way of reimbursement of RCMC (Registration-cum-membership certificate) Charges.

6.4.2. Multilateral and Bilateral matters:

To strengthen international cooperation within MSME sector, the Ministry has entered into Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and Joint Action Plans with Tunisia, Romania, Rwanda, Mexico, Uzbekistan, Lesotho, Sri Lanka, Algeria, Sudan, Côte d'Ivoire, Egypt, South Korea, Mozambique, Botswana, Indonesia, Vietnam, Sweden, UAE, USA and Mauritius.

- **Memorandum of Understanding signed:**
 - MoU of cooperation in MSME sector was signed on 10th March, 2025 between Ministry of MSME and Ministry of Industry, SME and Cooperatives (SME Division), the Republic of Mauritius.
 - MoU was signed on 3rd April, 2025 between NSIC, Office of Small and Medium Enterprises Promotion (OSMEP), Kingdom of Thailand on co-operation in MSME sector.
 - MoU was signed on 9th April, 2025 between NSIC and Slovak Business Agency (SBA), Slovak Republic for co-operation in MSME.
 - MoU was signed on 16th October, 2025 between NSIC, Small And Medium Enterprises Corporation Malaysia for co-operation in the field of MSME.
- **MoU with Export Promotion Council**

MoU between Ministry of MSME and Ayush Export Promotion Council (AYUSHEXCIL) signed on 24th April, 2025. As per MoU, AYUSHEXCIL has been engaged as Implementation Agency for Capacity Building of First Time Exporters' (CBFTE) component under the IC Scheme.
- **Bilateral Meetings:**
 - **India-Germany MSME Cooperation Meeting:** A meeting between the Hon'ble Minister for MSME and delegation of the German Association for Small and Medium-

sized Enterprises (BVMW), led by Mr. Christoph Ahlhaus, Managing Director and Chairman of the Federal Executive Board, BVMW was held on 17th November 2025 at New Delhi. During the meeting, both sides explored Research and Delevelopment and innovation partnerships, particularly through Germany's ZIM Programme, and reaffirmed their commitment to build resilient value chains and advancing bilateral cooperation through joint frameworks.

- **India–Mauritius MSME Cooperation Meeting:** A meeting was held on February 21, 2025, in New Delhi, between the Hon'ble Minister of State, Ministry of MSME, Republic of India and a delegation led by the Hon'ble Minister of Industry, SME and Cooperatives, Republic of Mauritius. The meeting was attended by senior officials from Ministry of MSME and the Ministry of External Affairs. During the meeting, both sides shared good practices, possible exchange of technology and cooperation for development of MSME.
- 5th meeting of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) Joint Working Group (JWG) constituted under India-Japan Industrial Competitiveness Partnership (IJICP) was held on July 23rd, 2025, in New Delhi. The meeting was led by Joint Secretary, M/o MSME from India side and Mr. Toshiyuki Shimano, Director, Southwest Asia Office, Ministry of Economy Trade and Industry (METI) from Japan side.

General Statutory Obligations

7.1 Official language

- 7.1.1** Government policy envisages the progressive increase in the use of Hindi in official work. During the year, Ministry of MSME took effective measures to ensure compliance with the Official Language Policy, implementation of the Annual Programme, and adherence to various orders of the Government of India issued on the recommendations of the Committee of Parliament on Official Language.
- 7.1.2** The Ministry of MSME is implementing the Official Language Act, 1963 and the Official Language Rules, 1976 (as amended from time to time) to achieve the targets set by the Department of Official Language. The Ministry continues to advance towards making Hindi the language of government work and meeting the expectations of the Parliamentary Committee on Official Language.
- 7.1.3** During the year, in compliance with Section 3(3) of the Official Language Act, 1963, documents related to the Parliamentary Standing Committee, Cabinet Notes, notifications, resolutions, contracts, agreements, tender forms and notices, rules, parliamentary questions and answers, papers laid on both Houses of Parliament, administrative reports, etc. were issued in both Hindi and English. All advertisements are released bilingually. The Ministry's website is primarily in Hindi and efforts are on to keep it updated bilingually. Rule 5 of the Official Language Rules is fully complied with and all letters received in Hindi are replied to in Hindi only.
- 7.1.4** Monitoring of offices under the administrative control of the Ministry was reinforced to review progress in Hindi usage and the Ministry team inspected the State Office of Khadi and Village Industries Commission, Bengaluru; Zonal Office of National Small Industries Corporation Ltd., Bengaluru; ni-msme, Hyderabad and NSIC Headquarters, New Delhi. Suggestions were provided to achieve annual programme targets set by the Department of Official Language, resulting in visible progress in Hindi work across subordinate offices.
- 7.1.5** Furthermore, the Parliamentary Committee on Official Language inspected subordinate offices of the Ministry including the Central Coir Technology Institute, Bengaluru; MSME Development Office, Bengaluru; KVIC State Office, Dehradun; NSIC Ltd., Noida; MSME Development Office Branch, Gwalior; and the Institute for Design of Electrical Measuring Instruments, Mumbai. The Committee expressed satisfaction with Hindi progress in almost

all the inspections. In these inspections, the Ministry was represented by the Deputy Director General (In charge, Official Language) and other nominated officers.

- 7.1.6** As per the guidelines of the Department of Official Language and the expectations of the Parliamentary Committee on Official Language, the Hindi Salahkar Samiti under the chairmanship of the Hon'ble Minister MSME has been constituted.
- 7.1.7 Hindi Diwas:** With a view to promoting the progressive use of Hindi in official work, September 2025 was observed as Hindi Month in the Ministry. During the period, eleven Hindi competitions were organised, witnessing record participation from officers and staff members across various levels.
- 7.1.8** Several new and innovative competitions were introduced, including Recitation, Picture Analysis, Storytelling, Paragraph Writing and Hindi Grammar, Official Language Knowledge, and Vocabulary competitions. These initiatives were aimed at breaking the monotony of conventional formats and providing participants with a sense of novelty, thereby encouraging enthusiastic and sustained engagement.
- 7.1.9** The competitions were carefully structured to assess participants comprehensively across multiple dimensions of Hindi language proficiency. For instance, the Recitation Competition focused on pure pronunciation and articulation, featuring running matter on diverse themes, including prose passages, poems, and ghazals. Ministry of MSME is reportedly the only Ministry to have organised such a specialised competition during Hindi Month.
- 7.1.10** In line with the Digital India initiative, prize money for the winners was transferred online, ensuring transparency and efficiency.
- 7.1.11** Hindi Fortnight/Week/Month was also celebrated with equal enthusiasm in subordinate offices under the Ministry. Notably, for the first time, a joint Hindi Day message from the Hon'ble Minister, MSME and the Hon'ble Minister of State was circulated to all subordinate offices and was also displayed on the Ministry's website, further reinforcing the commitment to the promotion of Hindi in official communication.

- 7.1.12** Other workshops organised by the Ministry covered topics such as “राजभाषा का अनुपालन और तिमाही प्रगति रिपोर्ट को भरना” and “सरकारी काम-काज में ई-टूल्स और एआई का उपयोग”. The workshops witnessed keen participation, and the queries raised by participants were addressed promptly during the sessions. Similarly, reports from all Sections of the Ministry, as well as from its attached and subordinate offices and autonomous bodies, were submitted and uploaded in a timely manner on the portal of the Department of Official Language.
- 7.1.13** Five subordinate offices were notified under Rule 10(4) of the Official Language Rules, where over 80 percent of employees had acquired working knowledge of Hindi. These included the Institute for Design of Electrical Measuring Instruments, Mumbai; MSME Development and Facilitation Office, Bengaluru; Indo German Tool Room, Indore; MSME Technology Centre, Bhopal; and Development Office, Kolkata. Headquarters were directed to update employees’ educational qualifications frequently and initiate the process of notifying eligible office under rule 10(4) and prepare rosters to make employees proficient in Hindi. Monitoring was intensified to raise awareness of official language provisions and arrangements for filling up regular Hindi posts.
- 7.1.14** Quarterly meetings of the Official Language Implementation Committee were held under the chairmanship of the Deputy Director General (In charge, Official Language) in the Ministry to discuss on the progressive report. As an innovative initiative, PowerPoint presentation has been started to sensitize the participants about the various provisions related to the official language.
- 7.1.15** The Ministry organised a Rajbhasha Sammelan on 03.02.2026 in presence of the Hon’ble Minister and the Hon’ble Minister of State. On the occasion, the inaugural issue of the Ministry’s Hindi magazine “*Udyami Mitra*” and the second issue of MGIRI, Wardha’s magazine “*Gramin Udyamita*” were released. Certificates of appreciation were also awarded to the winners of the Hindi Month-2025 competitions conducted in the Ministry and the Office of the Development Commissioner (MSME).
- 7.1.16** The Sammelan was attended by about 120 officers and employees in person, while around 240 subordinate offices participated online. The programme included a poetry recital by renowned poetess Ms. Priyanka Rai Nandini and a session on the provisions relating to the use of official language in Central Government offices. In their addresses, the Hon’ble Minister and the Hon’ble Minister of State emphasised the use of Hindi in day-to-day communication to enhance public understanding of the Ministry’s schemes and noted that such Sammelans promote the use of Hindi in official work and motivate officers.

7.2 Vigilance

- 7.2.1** The Vigilance set up in the Ministry of MSME is headed by a Joint Secretary level officer, who acts as part-time Chief Vigilance Officer (CVO) of the Ministry. CVO also acts as the nodal point for all vigilance matters, in consultation with the Central Vigilance Commission and Investigating Agencies.
- 7.2.2** The Ministry is implementing the guidelines / instructions issued by the Department of Personnel and Training and the Central Vigilance Commission in creating greater awareness of vigilance among the stakeholders. During the period under report, the references/ vigilance complaints received from various sources in the Ministry / Attached office / Organizations under the Ministry were scrutinised / disposed of, in consultation with Central Vigilance Commission, wherever applicable.
- 7.2.3** The Vigilance Division of Ministry deals with the Vigilance complaints and appeals preferred thereon in the cases of Ministry of MSME. It also provides vigilance comments on appeals

preferred by employees of the organisations functioning under the Ministry on the penalties imposed on them. Key functions performed by the Vigilance Division :

- i. Maintenance of Annual Performance Appraisal Reports (APARs) of Officers and Staff including online system of SPARROW.
- ii. All cases falling under CCS (Conduct) Rules, 1964 including Annual Property Return Statements of the employees.
- iii. Vigilance clearance for administrative purposes.
- iv. Communication with CVC and seeking its advice in the disciplinary cases of Ministry of MSME.

7.2.4 There are separate Vigilance Divisions in organisations under the administrative control of Ministry of MSME. Vigilance Divisions in these organisations are headed by considerably higher-level officers to assist the respective Heads of the organisations.

7.2.5 Annual Sectoral Review Meeting on Vigilance: The first Annual Sectoral Review Meeting with MSME sector was held on 30.12.2025 under the chairmanship of the Chief Vigilance Commissioner, Central Vigilance Commission (CVC). The meeting focused on preventive vigilance, systemic reforms, and good governance. The importance of MSME sector to the economy, along with key initiatives relating to digitalisation and adoption of technology, including implementation of the PM Vishwakarma Scheme, was highlighted by the Ministry. The CVO, Ministry of MSME, presented the prevailing vigilance scenario and ongoing initiatives, followed by organisation-wise presentations by the CVOs.

7.2.6 The meeting resulted in actionable measures to strengthen the vigilance framework, including expediting disciplinary proceedings, strengthening vigilance inspections, timely submission of Quarterly Progress Reports (QPRs), capacity building through training programmes, rotation of officials in sensitive posts, improved handling of PIDPI complaints, and clarity on the applicability of the Public Procurement Policy (MSE Order, 2012) to autonomous bodies.

7.2.7 Vigilance Awareness Week:

- Ministry of MSME observed Vigilance Awareness Week from 27th October 2025 to 2nd November 2025 with the theme given by Central Vigilance Commission:

“सतर्कता: हमारी साझा जिम्मेदारी”

“Vigilance: Our Shared Responsibility”

- During the Vigilance Awareness Week, Ministry of MSME organised various awareness programmes/ Seminars/ workshops/ capacity building training at the Ministry level as well as through the organizations under this Ministry. This will lead to awareness amongst the employees to work towards instituting corruption free philosophy /bring in transparency, maintain absolute integrity and devotion to duty at all times.

- Vigilance perspective trainings in iGOT Karmyogi Portal were assigned to all officers of Ministry of MSME to promote integrity, transparency and accountability. Slogan and essay competition were also organised during Vigilance Awareness campaign.
- A vigilance awareness event on 29th October 2025 was organised at Kartavya Bhawan-3 in Ministry of MSME, under the Chairmanship of Secretary, MSME. Officials from other organisations under Ministry also joined through virtual mode. The workshop was also attended by Shri Nitin Kumar, Joint Secretary, Central Vigilance Commission.
- Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) organized a vigilance awareness programme with participation from other organizations under the Ministry i.e. Coir Board and MGIRI on 25th November, 2025 at Mumbai, as a closing ceremony of Vigilance Awareness Campaign.
- National Small Industries Corporation Ltd. (NSIC) organized drawing, slogan writing and essay writing competition in light of vigilance awareness campaign and felicitated participants recognizing their active contribution. 185 employees in NSIC were trained in online mode on various vigilance related topics.
- Various Training sessions were organized by organisations under the Ministry for its officials.

7.3 Achievement under the Rashtriya Karmayogi, Large Scale Jan Seva Program

Under the Rashtriya Karmayogi, Large Scale Jan Seva Program (RK-LSJSP) Phase II, a total of 1,389 officials had been trained up to 13 January 2026. Subsequently, intensive training drives were conducted from 14 January to 31 January 2026, during which 13 additional

batches were organised and 601 more officials were trained. With this, the total number of officials trained under the programme reached 2,184 across the Ministry and its attached organisations, and the one-day training was successfully completed within the stipulated timeline.

7.4 Citizen's Charter

- 7.4.1** Citizens'/ Clients' Charter for M/o MSME have been prepared and the same can be viewed at Ministry's website. This Charter consists of a Declaration of the Ministry, incorporating its mission and commitment to MSME and for the people of India, in general.
- 7.4.2** Annual Reports, MSME Patrika, Handbook on Self Employment and Know Your Lender booklet have been published and are available for the information of potential entrepreneurs, policy makers and others. The website of the Ministry, i.e., www.msme.gov.in provides all the relevant information and link to its organisations.
- 7.4.3** The detailed Citizens'/ Clients' Charter of the Ministry is available on the website of the Ministry.
- 7.4.4** **Complaints:** The Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances (DARPG) have created a portal for public grievances- <http://pgportal.gov.in>. Any person can lodge his grievance on this portal. All grievances received by DARPG, Prime Minister's Office and President Secretariat are forwarded to the concerned Ministries through this portal/software. Grievance pertaining to other Ministries/Subordinate organisations can be transferred online. Ministry of MSME, Office of DC (MSME), NSIC and other subordinate organisations have been provided link to <http://pgportal.gov.in>. In FY 2025-26 a total of **3,65,68 grievances** were received on the portal and 3,57,06 (97%) were redressed with average disposal time of 9 days.
- 7.4.5** Ministry of MSME has a dedicated Grievance redressal portal CHAMPIONS. A portal for addressing grievances related to MSME: www.champions.gov.in. During the financial year 2025-26, Ministry of MSME CHAMPIONS portal received a total of 39,494 grievances, out of which 39,387 were successfully redressed by the CHAMPIONS Control Room. This reflects a disposal rate of 99.72 percent, reflecting the portal's strong responsiveness and the effectiveness of its grievance-redressal mechanisms.
- 7.4.6** Moreover, of the grievances replied during FY 2025-26, 25,503 grievances (around 64.75 percent) were redressed within 48 hours, demonstrating the portal's commitment to timely support and handholding MSME.
- 7.4.7** Recent initiatives include periodic reviews of Ministry of MSME grievance redressal mechanisms and associated portals, chaired by the Hon'ble Minister of State for MSME. These periodic assessments aim to strengthen system responsiveness, improve qualitative aspect of grievance, and ensure that MSME receive timely and effective support.

7.6 Prevention of Sexual Harassment

7.6.1 In accordance with the provisions contained in the Sexual Harassment of Women at Work Place (Prevention and Redressal) Act, 2013, an Internal Complaints Committee has been constituted in the Ministry.

7.6.2 During the year 2025-26, one complaint has been received under POSH Act, 2013 and was disposed of by the ICC as per the provisions of the Act.

- 7.6.3 The online complaint management system- “She-box” (Sexual Harassment Electronic-Box) introduced by the Ministry of Women and Child Development to enable women employees of the Central Government to file complaints directly. It has been given wide publicity by the Ministry among its employees and attached/subordinate organizations.
- 7.6.4 A physical She-Box has been installed on the premises. During the year 2025-26, a workshop has been conducted.
